

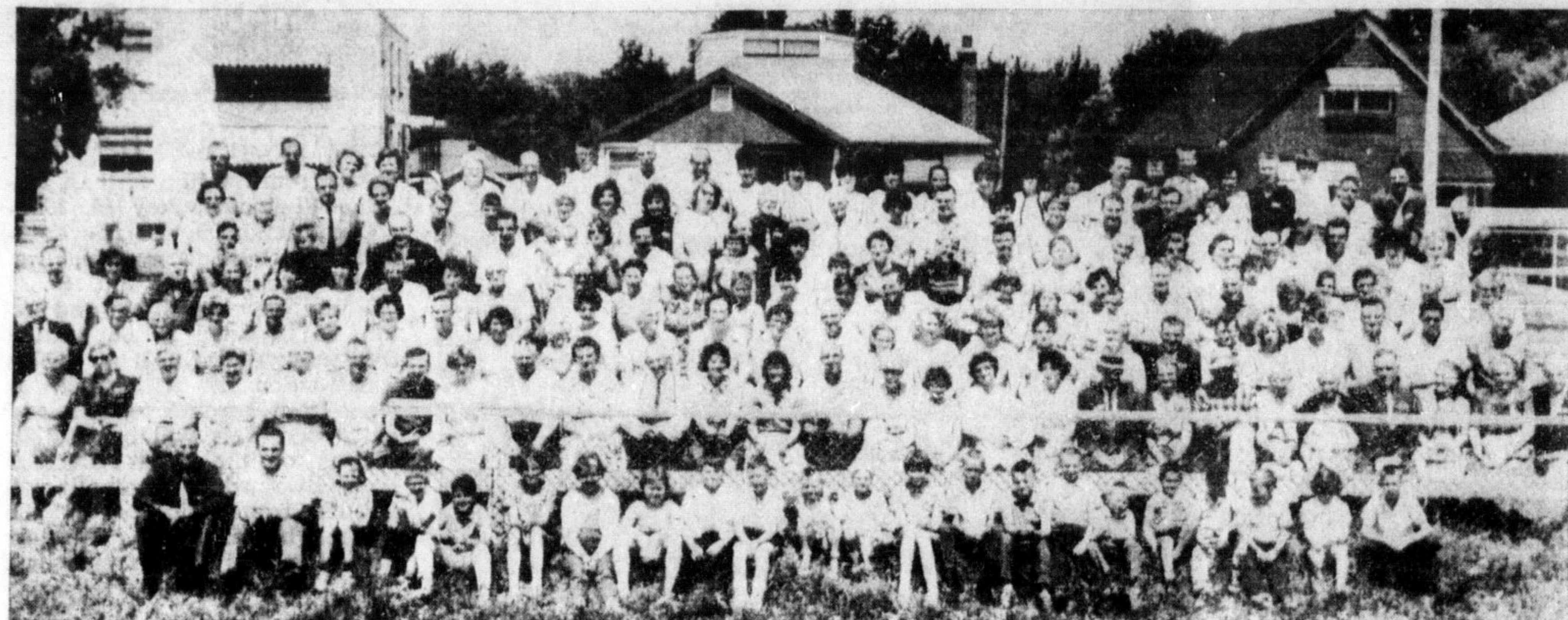
### Vince Mountford M.C. At Garden Party Sat.

### Active Milton Resident Albert Barton, 78, Dies

A former inspector of service installations for the Town of Milton, Albert Barton of 16 Robert St., Milton died suddenly of a heart attack at his home on Saturday, July 4. Funeral service was held on Tuesday, July 7th from Grace Anglican Church, Milton with Canon F. H. Mason M.A., B.D., officiating. Interment followed in Evergreen Cemetery, Milton.

Mr. Barton who was born in England in 1887, came to this country in 1911 and in September 1912 he married the former Mary Anne Dowling, who predeceased him in January 1959.

For a number of years, Mr. Barton owned and operated a dairy which supplied a great part of the town of Milton with dairy produce from his farm where the dairy was located a mile south-west of the town on Bronte St.

Upon retirement from the farm in 1945 he moved to Milton where he was employed by the Milton Farm Co-Op. During the following years Mr. Barton built several houses in Milton and also purchased and renovated a property on Main St. Several years ago Mr. Barton owned a rare Pennyfarthing bicycle which he rode on special occasions and in the parades which were held in town. He also played in the town band and was a member of the Milton Fire Team.

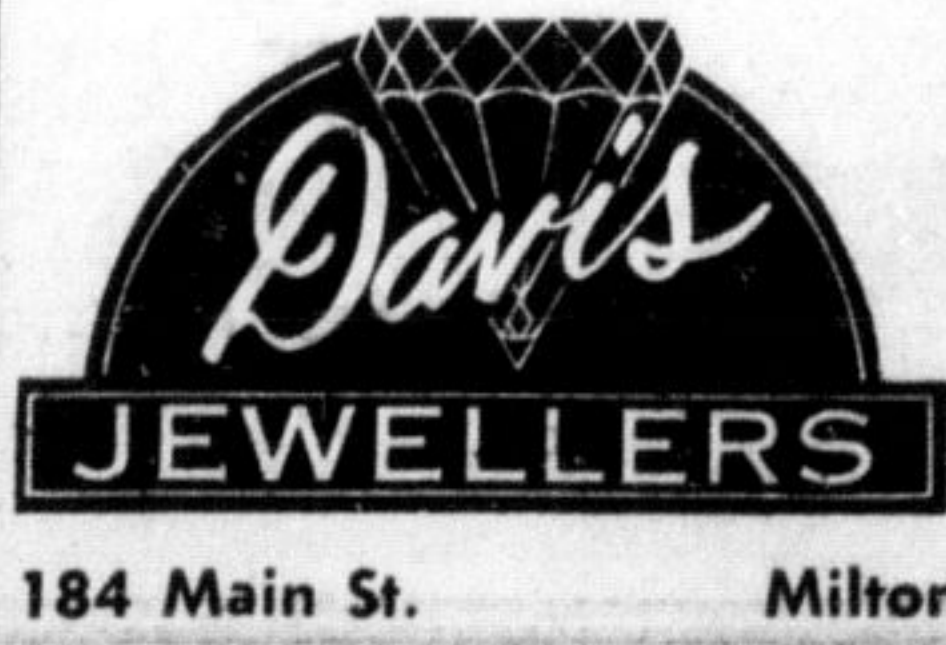
During his latter years Mr. Barton worked as an inspector for the town when new services were installed as the town expanded. Mr. Barton is survived by his sons Arthur and Marshall of Toronto, Jack of Lowville and one daughter Bertha, (Mrs. D. Gellow) of Chatham, also nine grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. He was predeceased by his wife and one daughter Mary, who died in 1950.

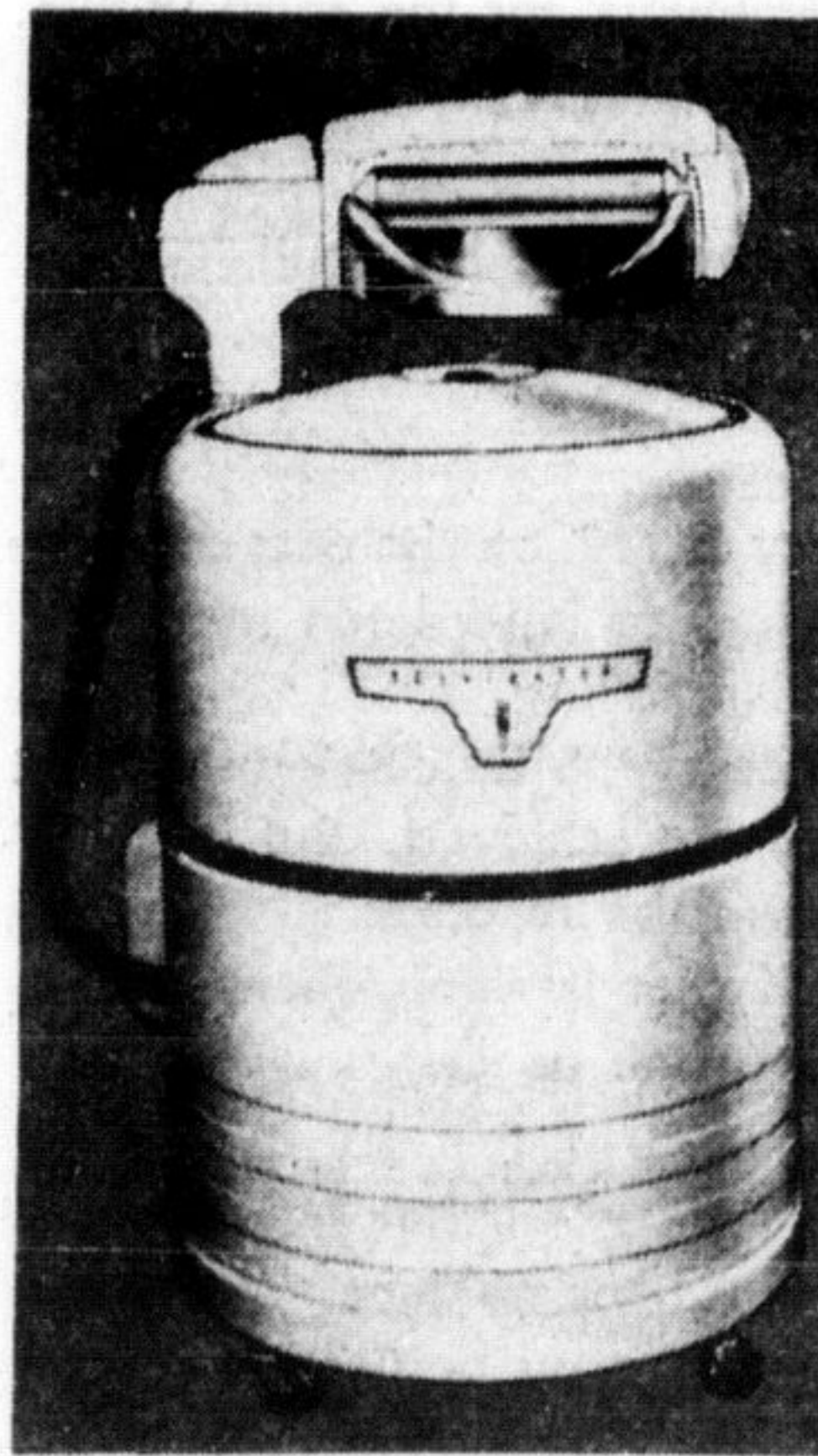
