**WATER PRICE UP**

Dear Editor:  
I thought the citizens of Milton and district should know that there was a By-law No. 17-64 passed at a recent Milton Council meeting.

This by-law dictated to several out-of-town residents who have been paying two and one-half times the Town metered water rates, that they would be put on a flat domestic rate, which has increased their water bills over 400 per cent and a few nearly 1000 per cent.

The reason? We were not consuming enough water, so Citizens of Milton, there cannot be a water shortage.

These rural homes have wells and cisterns and our bathrooms, washing, and garden watering is done from these so that is the reason we are conserving Milton water, and have always paid on a metered basis for all Milton water used and at two and a half times town rate.

Next week I will write another letter stating exact figures of my last paid metered water bill and the new bill issued at two and a half times town flat domestic rate for water I cannot use, as I have a soft water system in my residence and my daughter's apartment.

Also, I will quote the verbal agreement I had with the County Engineer when the original water main crossed the corner field of my farm.

Next week my letter to the Citizens of Milton will state discriminating facts.

**Harold Middlebrook Tops Field Crop Competition**

Entries in Halton Agricultural Society's field crop contest in oats were judged Friday by Elgin Laughlin of Orangeville, and the first prize winner was Harold Middlebrook of R.R. 2, Milton, with 92½ points out of a possible 100 on his Gary oats.

Second prize winner was George E. Readhead, R.R. 2, Milton, with 91½ on his Rodney oats. The judge reported the first and second prize winners would average 95 bushels per acre on their crops.

**Col. G. Brown Injured In Mount Albert Crash**

On Thursday, July 30, about 9:30 a.m. a Chrysler Imperial sedan driven by Mrs. Hilda Shannon of Scarborough rammed the driver's side of a 1962 Rambler driven by Lieut. Col. Gordon Brown, R.R. 2, Georgetown, who was on his way to go fishing with Calvin Bailey in Haliburton. Mrs. Shannon, who had her two small sons with her, escaped with lacerations and they were not detained at the hospital but Col. Brown was thrown across the front seat and through the passenger door, finally landing in the ditch with the car.

He was taken to York County Hospital, Newmarket, where his injuries were found to be a cracked pelvis, an injury to the back of his head, a crushed chest with several broken ribs, as well as serious internal injuries. However, since an extensive operation Saturday morning, his condition has improved considerably. While the doctors expect him to be on the critical list for about three weeks, his chances for a complete recovery, provided no complications develop, are good.

The accident happened at Mount Albert, east of Newmarket on a dangerous blind corner where a house with trees in front of it completely obscures the view from his approach until one is almost half way across the highway as well as making it almost impossible for Mrs. Shannon to see him in time as she came down the highway. According to the constable who investigated there were no skid marks.

On Saturday when insurance investigators went to see the spot, another similar accident had just happened and spectators informed them it was the third in three days, and that two weeks ago another car had landed in the same spot on its roof. Yet there are no lights at the corner except for some at a double rail crossing nearby which only flash if a train is coming.

The Rambler was completely wrecked while the Chrysler appeared to have suffered only minor damage across the front.

Col. Brown is a member of the Court of Revision and of the Esqueving township planning board. For years he was secretary-treasurer of the North Halton High School District Board. Within the last two months he has returned from a 29,000 mile trip to India and back, without accident.

**No Serious Outbreak Of Army Worms Here**

No serious outbreak of army worms has been discovered in Halton County to date, but nearby areas have serious infestations.

If you check your crops in mid-day, you may not see any worms, as these worms burrow into the soil or crawl under stones or clods of dirt for daytime protection. The worms feed in the evening, so if you check your crops at dusk, you will see the worms feeding.

**Check Everywhere**  
When you check your crop, be sure to cover every square foot of the ground — don't be content to check one small corner of the field. Oat and corn fields may look alright today, but be half eaten tomorrow.

Full grown larvae are two inches long, dark greenish-brown with white stripes on each side and one down the middle of the back.

They have a habit of cutting the oat panicle so oat kernels will be found on the ground where feeding is moderate to heavy. In corn, the worms do not move to the ground during the day, but remain in the plant.

Control materials are Sevin and Malathion. For information on rates and methods of application, contact the Ontario Department of Agriculture, Milton.

**TOLL RISES**

Accident figures for the month of July showed an increase in the number of collisions in the North Halton area, Milton O.P.P. report. In July there were 49 accidents (the worst month since March) with 10 persons injured and \$24,465 worth of property damage resulting.
