Halton Health Unit Sponsors Childbirth, Parenthood Class

Four series of classes on childbirth and expectant parenthood will be conducted in Milton and Georgetown beginning in September, Miss Grace J. Leavey, director of nursing of Halton County Health Unit, announced today. There will be nine classes in each series, and the evening classes will be held weekly in both Georgetown and Milton, beginning on September 17, November 26, February 11 and April 15.

There will be two classes when both parents attend, which provides an opportunity for the parents to share in acceptable knowledge and information available on family health. This medical and community supported program is a family centred one and does promote a wider understanding of the general health aspects of pregnancy in relation to family health.

Practice Relaxation
To encourage proper body mechanics, relaxation procedures and techniques are demonstrated and practiced by the registrants. The public health nurse providing instruction is acutely aware of existing needs and individual differences. For purposes of clarity, various methods of illustrative materials are utilized. Class participation and group discussion is encouraged as a supportive measure in providing desired information.

Mimeographed copies of subject material are supplied to each participant at the close of each class.

Need Permission
A signed request from the family doctor is required for enrollment.

Further information is available from the local office of the Health Unit.

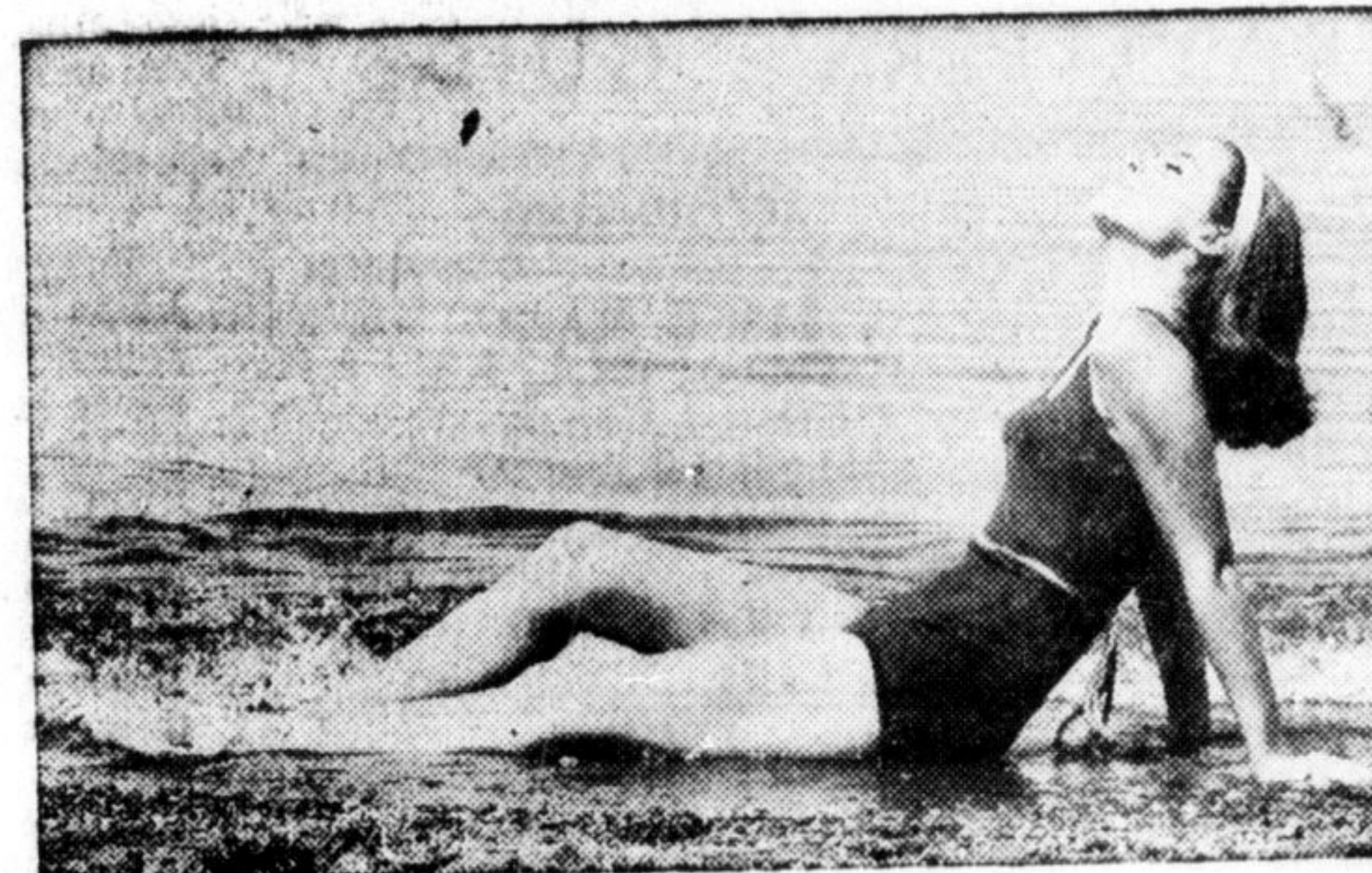
