At last week's meeting of Milton Council:

- Mayor S. G. Childs declared the period of August 31 to September 7 as 'Old Fashioned Days' in Milton, in co-operation with the Chamber of Commerce.

- Council endorsed a motion from the city of Barrie calling for new legislation to permit municipalities to plant trees at municipal expense on private property, provided the trees are within eight feet of the town property line.

- Heslop Road residents were to be notified work on new sidewalks would begin in a few weeks.

- Councillor Charles Johnson reported the industrial committee would be unable to have booths prepared for the Steam Reunion and the Chamber of Commerce Trade Fair. It was too late to set anything up now, he said, and besides the committee has no industrial sites in town to offer for sale. "When we have the industrial sites to show people, a stand will be erected with professional help that could be used for other occasions," he noted.

- Assessor John Charlton acted as clerk for the meeting, in the absence of Deputy-Clerk and Treasurer Audrey Brush, who is holidaying.

- Approval was received from the Department of Municipal Affairs for the town to improve a Mary St. parking lot and apply for a grant on the work. Earlier it was feared the town could not set up a parking lot on the county-owned property without doing the work through the local Park

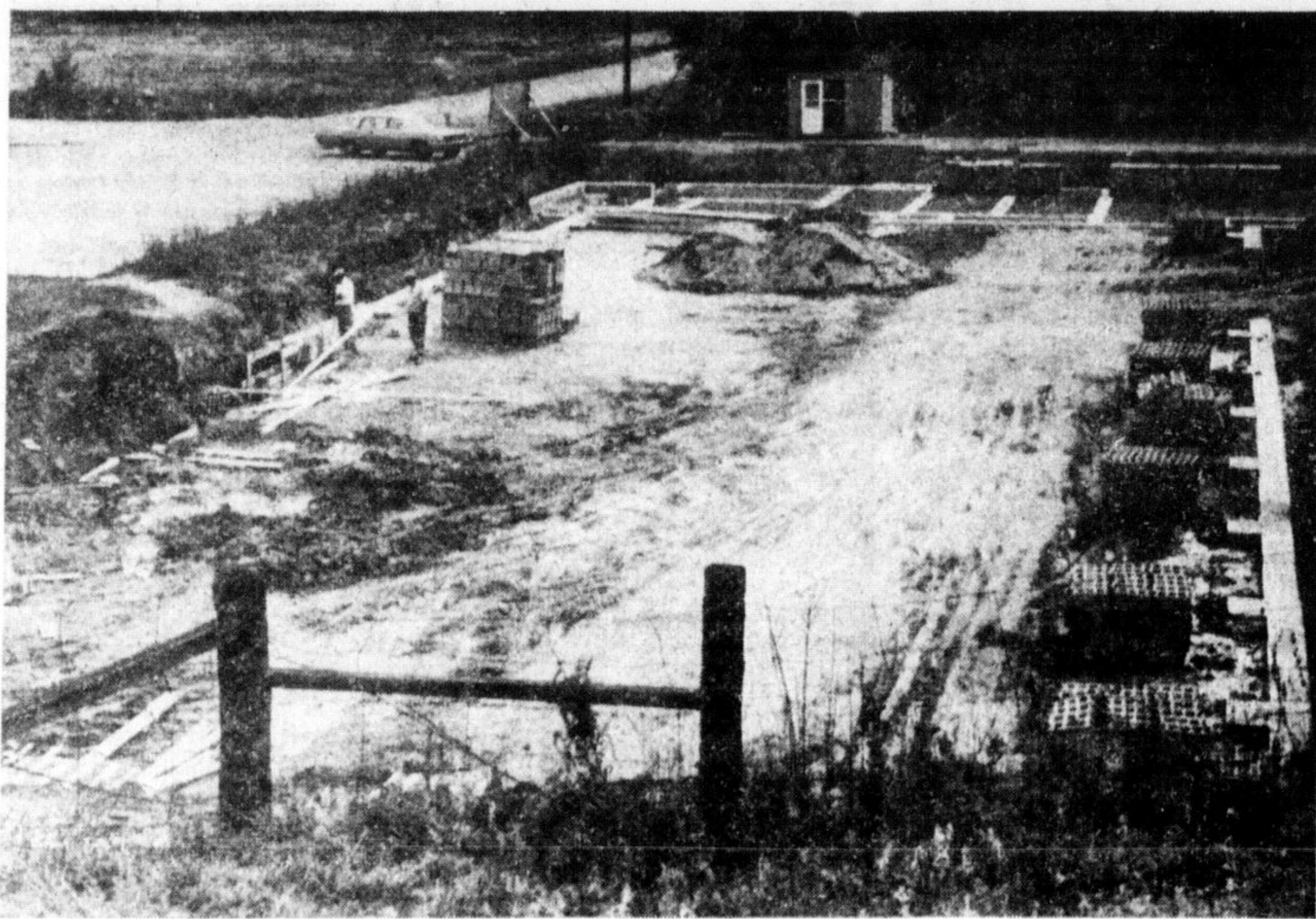

**MILTON CURLING CLUB** is underway, and last week workmen poured the concrete footings for the new building in Millside Plaza (near the C.N.R. station). The \$100,000 club will be open for first play this winter, following a public subscription campaign here this year. It will include four sheets of ice plus club house facilities. The sport was a popular one in Milton's past history, but died out in the early 1900's and the new club is the start of curling's revival here.

**We're Winning War on Weeds**

The weed situation in Milton is "generally good" and the town weed inspector Wilf Penson was commended on his job recently, when Halton Weed Inspector V. E. McArthur of Lowville submitted a mid-summer weed report to Milton Council.

Mr. McArthur inspected the entire town on July 29 and was pleased with the way the residents have been taking care of weeds. Properties infested with weeds (mainly vacant lots) are cut by the weed inspector and the cost is charged on the owner's tax bill if he does not heed the warning to clean up his own property.

The County Inspector suggested council consider a roadside and park spraying program in future years. Kingsleigh Court play area was infested with Chickory and other weeds susceptible to 2,4-D, he noted, and a spray program would reduce the amount of weed cutting necessary.

—A Durham man's car received \$100 damage Friday in a collision with a hydro pole and guidance on Fve Sideroad east of the Guelph Line. The pole and posts received \$160 damage, Milton O.P.P. report.
