**Director of Local Steam-Era D. Rogers, Stoney Creek, Dies**

The annual "Steam Era", sponsored by the Ontario Steam and Antique Preservers' Association, lost a valued member, a constant promoter and a tireless worker on Thursday, August 6, with the sudden death of director David H. Rogers of 50 Charles St., Stoney Creek.

Mr. Rogers — "Dave" to all who knew him — was an Ontario Provincial Policeman for 34 years before his retirement in 1961. Since retirement, he spent a great deal of his time tinkering with his own two steam engines, promoting the group's annual Labor Day weekend reunion in Milton, and busying himself with the business of organizing and running the shows here.

On Executive His loss will be felt deeply by fellow members of the Association. Mr. Rogers has been an executive member since the club was founded. He and his wife have been in charge of publicity for the past two years.

He succumbed to a heart attack at his summer home at Wasaga Beach on August 6. Funeral service was held August 9, with many Association members and O.P.P. friends from Milton and district attending. He was 64.

Surviving are his wife Lorna, a son Thomas A. of Winona, and

a daughter Betty-Ann, at home; also a brother Joseph A. of Streetsville, and two grandsons.

Mr. Rogers joined the O.P.P. in 1927 and served terms in Oakville, Dundas and Stoney Creek before heading the Brantford detachment from 1953 until his retirement in 1961. He was promoted to Corporal in 1949 at Dundas, and in 1953 he was promoted to Sergeant and received a 25-year pin from the Ontario Civil Services Quarter Century Club.

Full police rites were given at the funeral, held Sunday from Stoney Creek to Streetsville Presbyterian Church. Hundreds of police officers attended, including Sgt. C. Wilkinson of Milton O.P.P. detachment and two of his constables, Al Cook and Tom Dube, who form part of the specially-trained O.P.P. marching squad. A police motorcycle escorted the funeral party from Stoney Creek to Streetsville, and members of the marching group acted as pallbearers and a guard of honor.

Police from Niagara, Burlington, Downsview and Peterborough district were represented at the service, and Inspector I. R. Robbie, commanding officer of Burlington No. 3 district, led the marchers.

Burial was at the Streetsville cemetery.
