Mrs. C. A. Elsley Celebrates 90th Birthday

Forty-four friends and grandchildren gathered at the home of Mr. and Mrs. William Mahon of R.R. 2, Campbellville for a party in honor of Mrs. C. A. Elsley who celebrated her 90th birthday on Friday. Mrs. Elsley, now living in Milton with her granddaughter Mrs. Bob McPhail, spent 68 years living in Campbellville. She is a widow of a well-known and respected village storekeeper, C. A. "Bert" Elsley, who was one of the original Campbellville trustees.

Still in good health although a little hard of hearing, Mrs. Elsley's memories of those early days take her back to the time when she first arrived and found the village "a rough place to live."

**Early Days**  
The Elsleys came to Campbellville and bought a store in 1895. It later was turned into an apartment building and it burned down in 1957. She recalls the Lewis brickworks was closed at the time and the large mill was idle, but the hotel did the best trade of all the community businesses.

Her husband joined with D. D. Christie (of the Lime Kilns) and Murray Crawford of Crawford's mill and they decided to clean up the village and make it a decent place to live. Mr. Elsley was one of the three first chosen to be a village trustee in 1914. The hotel burned down in 1929.
