Early Days

The Elslevs came to Campbellville and bought a store in 1895. It later was turned into an apartment building and it burned down in 1957. She recalls the Lewis brickworks was closed at the time and the large mill was idle, but the hotel did the best trade of all the community businesses.

Her husband joined with D. D. Christie (of the Lime Kilns) and Murray Crawford of Crawford's mill and they decided to clean up the village and make it a decent place to live. Mr. Elsley was one of the three first chosen to be a village trustee in 1914. The hotel burned down in 1929.




