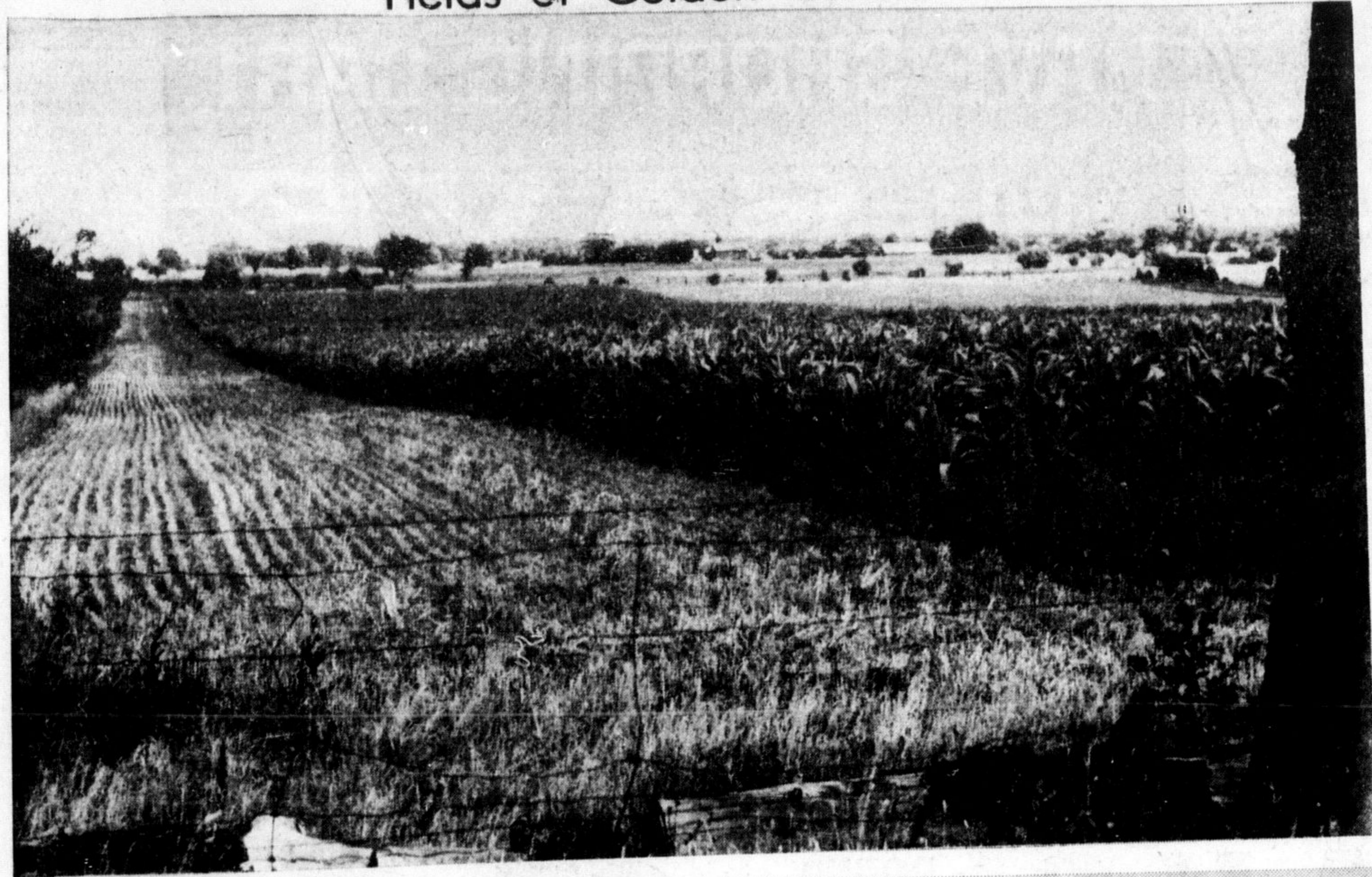

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Agriculture's Role

One Farmer Feeds 27 People

Sunday school teacher — who can tell me what we must do before our sins are forgiven? Johnny — Sin.

At this year's CNE, the Ontario Department of Agriculture has an exhibit portraying the role of agriculture in our society. Agriculture is Ontario's largest industry creating employment for over 275,000 people and spending over \$900,000,000 each year.

To many people agriculture is just plowing fields and milking cows. But the agricultural industry is more than farming. Bakeries, grain mills, canners, food processors and the dairy products industry all use raw materials from farms to produce goods in the forms which consumers want and will purchase. Retail and wholesale trades distribute these products to homemakers.

During the past 20 years agriculture has more than doubled in efficiency. Today one farmer can feed 27 people, while 20 years ago, he could feed only 11. Research carried out under the Ontario Department of Agriculture has increased crop and livestock production and improved the quality of farm products. While there are fewer farmers, today's machinery and efficient methods, make it possible to produce more food better goods.

LOCK POISONS
A farm is likely to have more insecticides and other poisons than other places. The National Safety League of Canada urges farmers to lock such perilous items away from small children.

FARM DEATHS
An accident kills a farm resident every 3.7 hours. A farmer is killed every 7.3 hours in a work accident, according to the National Safety League of Canada.
