Council rescinded the summer water restrictions, effective Tuesday, September 1, at Monday's meeting of council. At the same time, council urged residents to use common sense and conserve as much water as possible for emergency and firefighting purposes.

Restrictions were imposed on May 25, limiting residents to two hours of hose use per week. The town was split into
