Lightning Hits Disposal Plant Hydro Man Hurt During Storm

A heavy lightning and rainstorm that hit Milton and district on Friday evening caused some damage at the town's sewage disposal plant, and a Milton Hydro employee was injured during the storm.

Ed Ramsbottom, Kingsleigh Court, Milton, a linesman with Milton Hydro, was climbing a pole at Campbellville during the height of the storm when his spurs slipped, and he fell about 10 feet to the ground. He received back injuries but no bones were broken.

Lightning struck the Fulton St. sewage plant, burning out a large motor on a blower, and ripping through a transformer. Treatment service was interrupted for an hour while the motor was replaced. Town workmen manned the Robert, Fulton and Woodward St. pumping stations from 11 p.m. until 5:30 a.m. to make sure the motors kept working. Sewers are reported to have backed up in three basements along Bell St. Near Streetsville, lightning reportedly killed five cattle in a field.

Prohibit Parking One Side of Main

There will be no parking along the North side of Main St. during the two weekend parades, Milton Police and the Chamber of Commerce announced today. Residents and visitors are urged to keep their cars off the North side of the thoroughfare to make sure there is room for the two parades and the crowd expected to attend. The parades leave Milton Plaza to head down Main St. at 7 p.m. Friday evening and at 12:30 p.m. Saturday afternoon. Parking will be prohibited on the North side of Main St. from 6 p.m. Friday and from 11:30 a.m. Saturday until after each parade has ended.
