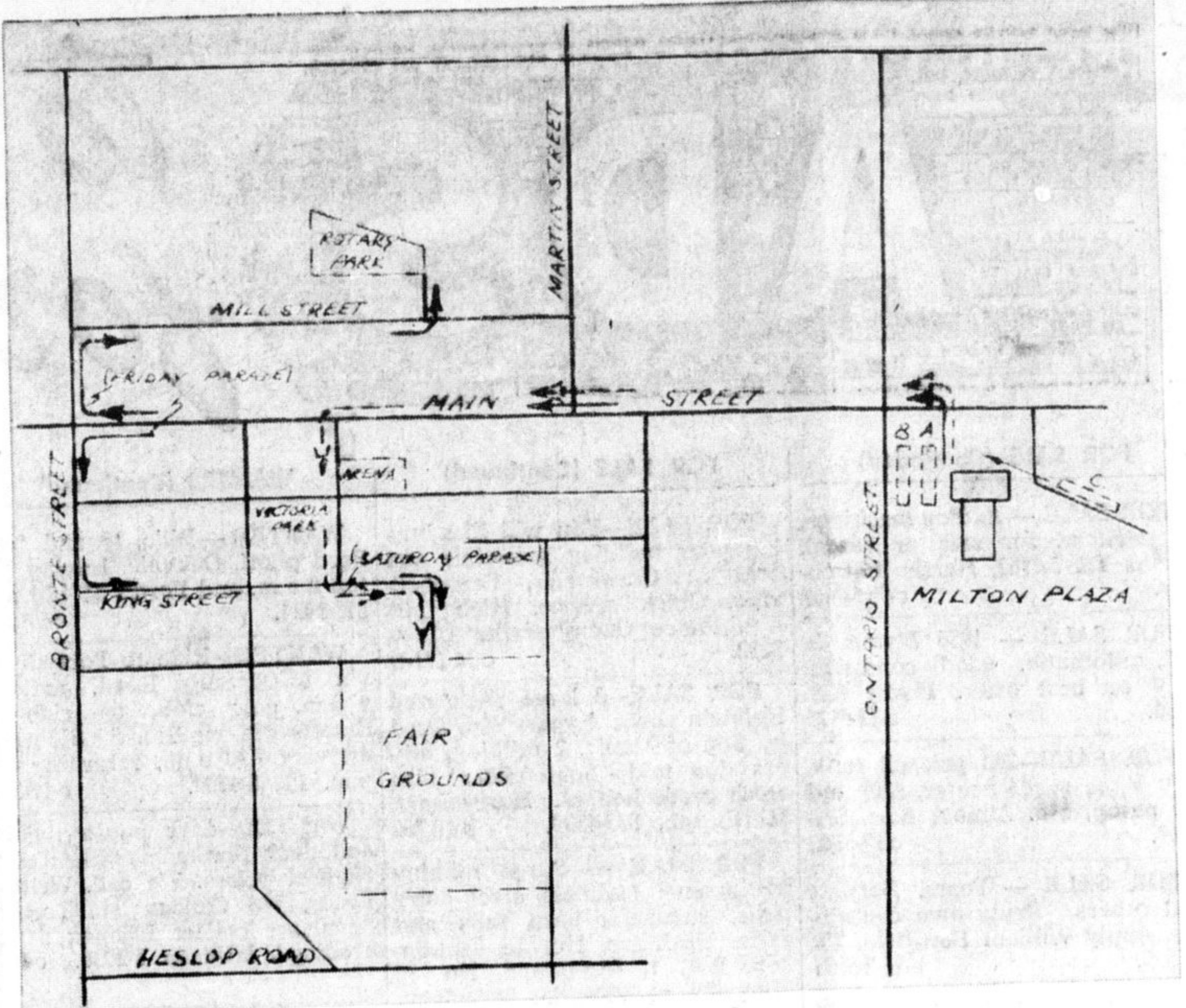

New subjects to be offered this year include pastels, first aid, rug making and metalcraft. A decision on the men's shop courses is being held over until next week until high school principal R. C. Hunter checks on the availability of teachers for the drafting, electricity, machine

shop and woodworking courses. **Popular Courses**  
Courses held last year that seemed popular enough to repeat included bookkeeping, conversational French, leathercraft, typing, elementary art, intermediate art, advanced art, millinery, smoking, advanced sewing, tailoring, floriculture and elementary sewing. Physical education will be dropped because the high school gymnasium will not be available.

The courses are expected to start October 27 and run each Tuesday night until Dec. 15. After Christmas resume Jan. 4 to March 2. Application forms will be distributed and printed in the Champion about Sept. 24 and flyers will be distributed in the rural areas of Halton.
