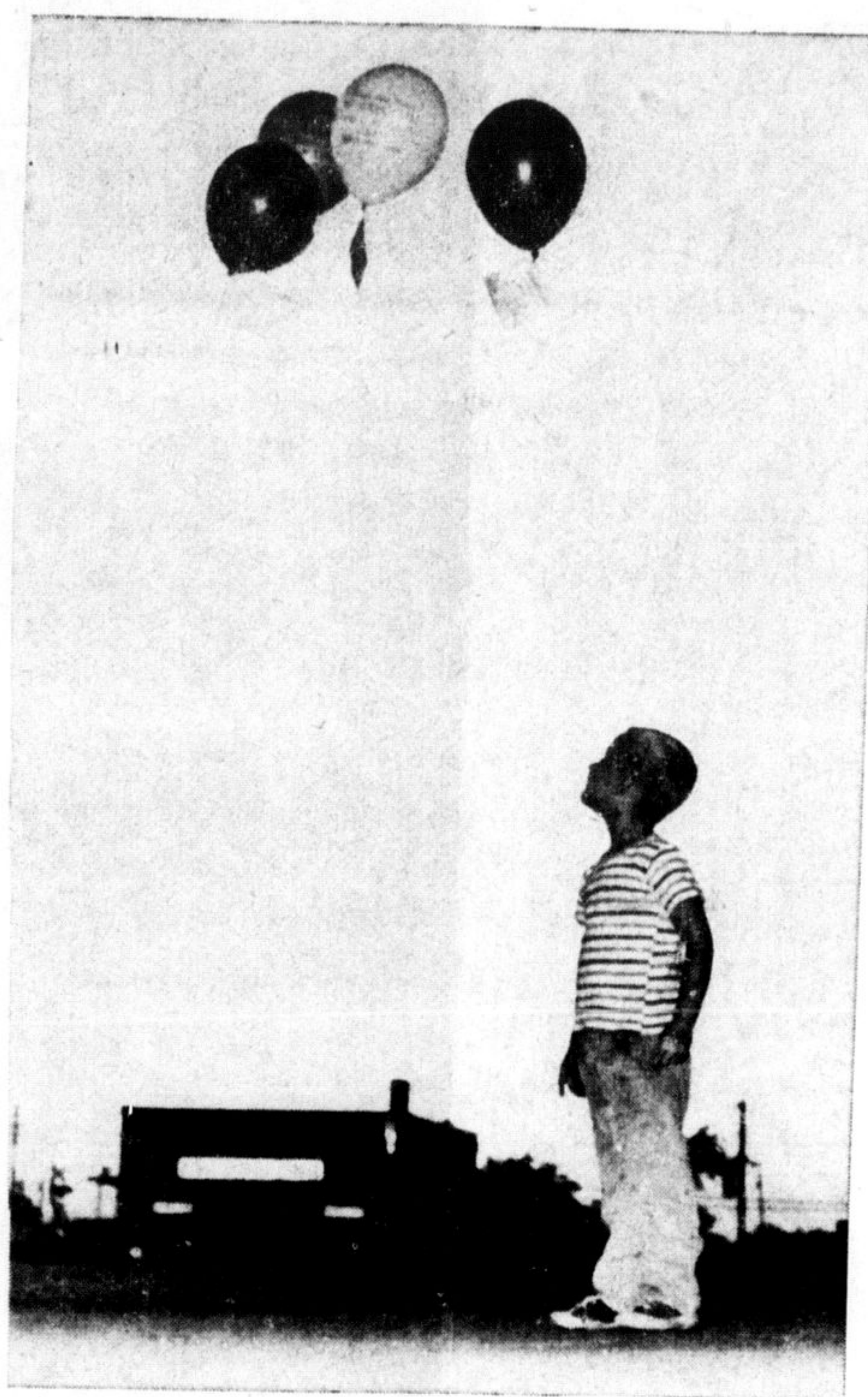

CORNER CRASHES

Intersections are dangerous because too many drivers do unexpected things. They are liable to turn abruptly, often from the wrong lane; signal improperly, or not at all; screech to a sudden stop; rush through on a changing light.

To guard against the crossroads crash, the Ontario Safety League recommends these three steps when approaching the intersection: 1. Slow down. 2. Have your foot off the accelerator and over the brake pedal — just in case. 3. Look to the left first, then right, when entering the intersection.
