11 St. John Men Here

Form Nucleus of Ambulance Corps

Several Milton men will be on duty at the fair grounds during this weekend's Steam-Era program as qualified members of the St. John Ambulance Brigade, Stan Callard of Elmwood Crescent reported today. Mr. Callard, who is anxious to organize a St. John Ambulance section in Milton, told The Champion that several men whom he personally trained will be on duty with members of the Acton and Georgetown St. John Ambulance Brigades during the weekend.

Mr. Callard, a Sgt. in the Acton Brigade, announced that A. Strath, W. Riddell, G. Winney, E. Gaeton, L. Wallis, R. Schutte, G. MacDougall, D. Smith, C. Opsteen, R. Hill and himself, are holders of valid St. John Ambulance certificates and will form the nucleus of the proposed new Milton section. Presently he is hopeful that other members of the community and district who have valid St. John certificates will indicate an interest in the proposed section.

Seeks Meeting Place

He is now trying to make arrangements for a meeting place for the group. He stressed the service offered by the St. John Ambulance Brigade is a great benefit to the community and noted that it is not strictly an ambulance service.

"The men I have listed are qualified to give trained first aid," Mr. Callard said. He noted that although the Milton men will wear arm bands for the present, they are as qualified as anyone in full St. John Ambulance uniform. The cost of outfitting one man is approximately \$100.

Nurses, Cadets

In the future Mr. Callard is hopeful of training a nursing brigade and a cadet corp in Milton, but at present his main interest is getting a St. John Brigade established in the community.

Anyone who has a valid St. John certificate and who is interested in the proposed new section should contact Mr. Callard. His address is 268 Elmwood Crescent and his phone number is 878-6665.
