Caledon Town and Country Club Opens Dining Lounge for Public

Caledon Town and Country Club, Sixth Line, Nassagaweya, is proving to be the district's most popular year-round resort and family club.

Managers Ken Membry and Bernie Taylor report current membership is 200 and growing steadily. The two took over this year from the former Birch Hills Golf and Country Club, and new policies and additional facilities instituted by the new management have sparked a large increase in membership and in the general use of the club facilities.

The managers have announced a new policy whereby residents of the north Halton district can enjoy the use of the club without purchasing a membership. Beginning next week, the Caledon dining room is open for businessmen's lunches from noon to 2 p.m., except Sunday and Monday, and the dining lounge will be available to local groups for wedding receptions, dances or special parties.

"Although we are anxious to make Caledon Town and Country Club one of Ontario's best family membership country clubs, we want the local people from this district to be able to enjoy our facilities as well," explained Mr. Taylor. No reservations are necessary for lunches, and arrangements can be made with the managers for use of the dining lounge by large groups for special events.

The Caledon club was started in 1960 and today boasts a challenging nine-hole golf course; a 50 by 150 foot swimming pool completely filtered, chlorinated and illuminated; double tennis courts; archery range and skeet shooting facilities; overnight cabin accommodation; club house privileges; and suana steam baths.

Plans for the future include a winter program of skeet shooting, and arrangements can be made with the managers for use of the dining lounge by large groups for special events.

ing, safe children's toboggan trails, skiing, skating on the pond, and a weekly Saturday night dance open to members and the general public. The club even provides a baby-sitter service for adult functions on weekends.

Eventually, the golf course will be expanded into 18 holes, and a theatre for plays and a full scale gymnasium will be added to the club's present facilities.

All summer the managers have sponsored bi-weekly Friday night dances, and every Saturday night a full length movie film is shown to members, with a collection going to the Save the Children Fund.

The club house — which includes marble-floored dining lounge, a snack bar, club room, pro shop, cabins, suana baths and the room for the future theatre and gym — is a rustic-style converted barn. Outside is a paved patio area, complete with tables and umbrellas, which is so colorful beside the rustic decor of the club house that Toronto advertising agencies have used the setting as the location of two recent commercial films. One was shot on the patio and the second was filmed there last

week, using the club house, patio and swimming pool as scenery surrounding the new 1965 model cars.

"While the dining lounge is open to anyone for lunches or special occasions," Mr. Membry pointed out, "full club privileges are available through yearly memberships only." To encourage local families to inspect the grounds, special one day visitors' memberships are available at a nominal fee.

"We want people to drop out for a day and look over what the club has to offer. Just call in advance to let us know you're coming and we'll arrange for a tour," he added.

The club is located atop the Niagara Escarpment, on the Sixth Line, Nassagaweya, half a mile north of No. 5 Sideroad.
