HARLEY...to HALTON

The flag debate continues apart from Friday, when the estimates of the Department of Labor were discussed. Every Friday, a separate government department is discussed so that members are given an opportunity to discuss the expenditures of the various departments. Apart from this business, which takes all day Friday every week, the remainder of the time is devoted to the flag issue.

There have been two further votes during this flag debate. Both of these votes were on a non-debatable motion to adjourn the debate. The effect of this motion would be to stop the flag debate for that day only and the government could return to this matter the next day.

Motion Lost

The first attempt was defeated by the Liberals and Creditiste. The second similar vote a day later, was moved by a Creditiste and was supported by almost all members of the Opposition.

Cross party lines voting was even, one Liberal voting with the Opposition, and one member of the Opposition voted with the government. As this is a minority government, had all members been here, the motion would have carried, and the flag issue postponed for one day. Enough members were absent for the vote, however, so that the motion was lost, and the debate continued.

Suggest Committee

It has again been suggested that the flag resolution should be referred to a Special Committee of the House of Commons. This was previously agreed to by all the parties in the House of Commons, with the exception of the Conservatives, who objected to a time limit on debate after such a committee reported.

The committee as suggested would be composed of 15 members: seven Liberals, five Conservatives, one N.D.P., one Social Credit and one Creditiste. The committee would meet for a limited time. After the committee reported, the party leaders would then discuss a time limit on the debate itself.

Need Time Limit

The problem with this propo-

sal is that after the committee reports, we may be back where we started again unless there is a time limit agreed to. It seems to me that there is not too much to gain here unless there is some hope that the committee work will make some progress towards a conclusion to this flag debate.

The Prime Minister has again agreed to a meeting of the party leaders to discuss these proposals. From past experience, however, it seems that all the parties, except the Conservatives, are willing to discuss these matters and will consider compromise. On the other hand, the Conservatives have refused to do this and it seems unlikely that they will do so on this occasion. It would be hoped that some agreement could be reached, but I feel it is improbable.
