 usual fines and prosecution.
Right to Kelso
 Iroquoia Bruce Trail Club was formed at Hamilton on September 5, 1963, to build and maintain the trail from Grimsby through Hamilton to Kelso Conservation Area. Other objectives are building side trails where necessary; establishment and maintenance of campsites and shelters; a program of hikes for members; promotion of conservation, nature appreciation and preservation of historical sites. This program tends toward a better understanding of the area which will be more accessible through the trail.
 A first undertaking in this direction is the production of a map clearly indicating the location of the trail, and the best access points from which to start your hikes. This map will

be free to members, or may be obtained for 50 cents from the Club at P.O. Box 183, Hamilton, as soon as it is printed.
Plan Camps, Shelters
 In the future, however, is a task that goes beyond the financial resources of the group that has already contributed so freely of their time and money. Building and equipping campsites and shelters will involve a considerable capital expenditure. Again, it is intended to keep this as a purely volunteer effort. This means that financial help will be welcomed from those people who agree that this is a very worthwhile project indeed. From the Hamilton Naturalists Club has come a very much appreciated donation of \$50.
 Membership is \$5.00 for one adult or for one family. Student membership is \$2.00; youth organizations \$5.00; adult organiza-
