Council Gains Approval On Development Road
At a special meeting on Monday evening, Nassagaweya councillors met and received the approval of property owners who would be affected by the construction of the proposed new development road in the township. The road, to be constructed north of the 401 Highway between the Third and Fourth Lines, would take truck traffic away from the village of Campbellville.

Attending the meeting with the councillors were Mr. Patterson representing the Tullis Estates, Mr. Jupe representing an area resident and Mr. McArthur and

Mr. Davey representing Campbellville Gravel Supply. Councillors also agreed to hire Permount Paving and Construction to lay asphalt on the parking area in front of the Township Hall and to provide benches for the park area in Campbellville on the property of the former Elsley home. The Campbellville village trustees will be asked to maintain the park area after it is completed.

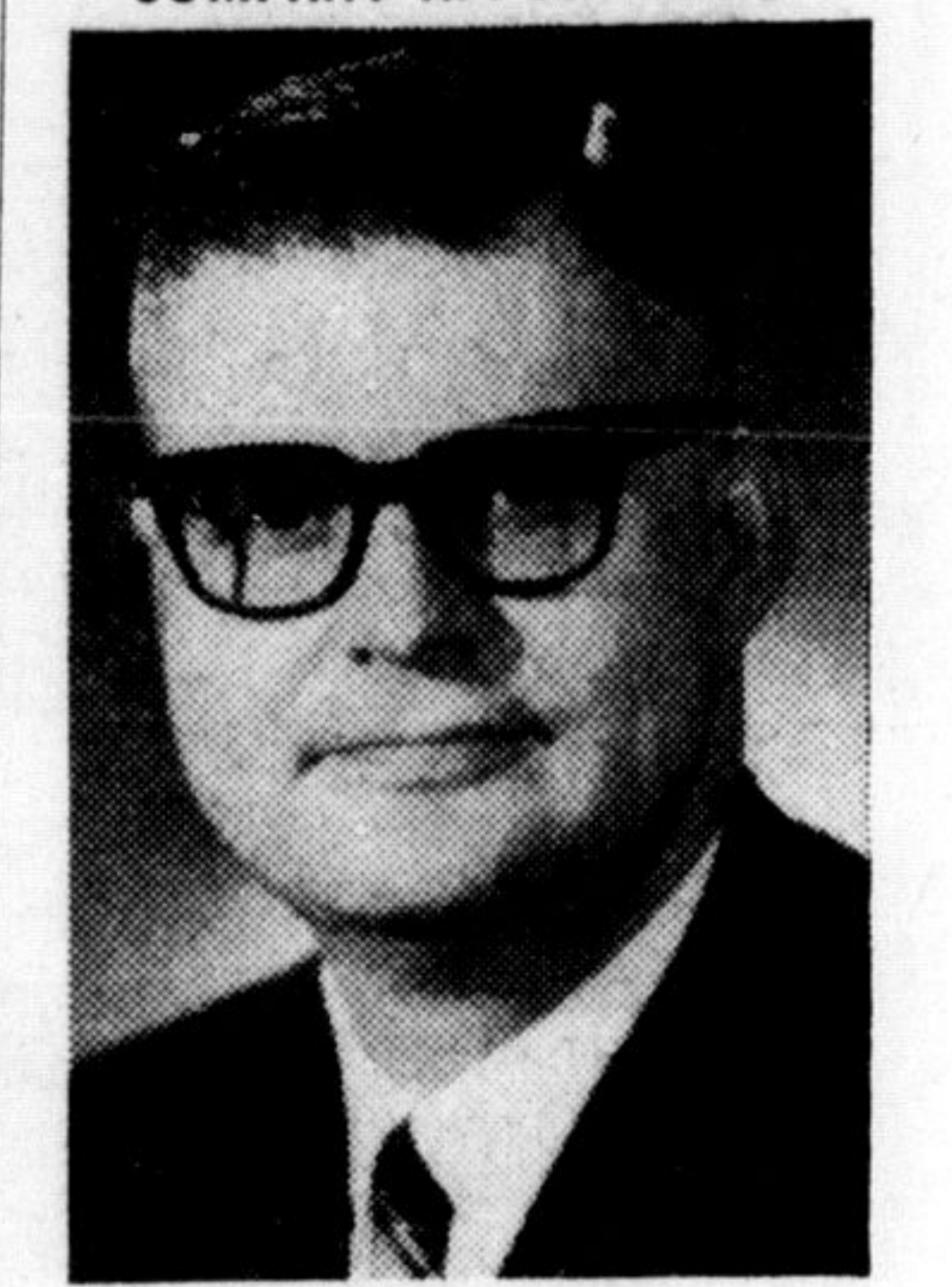

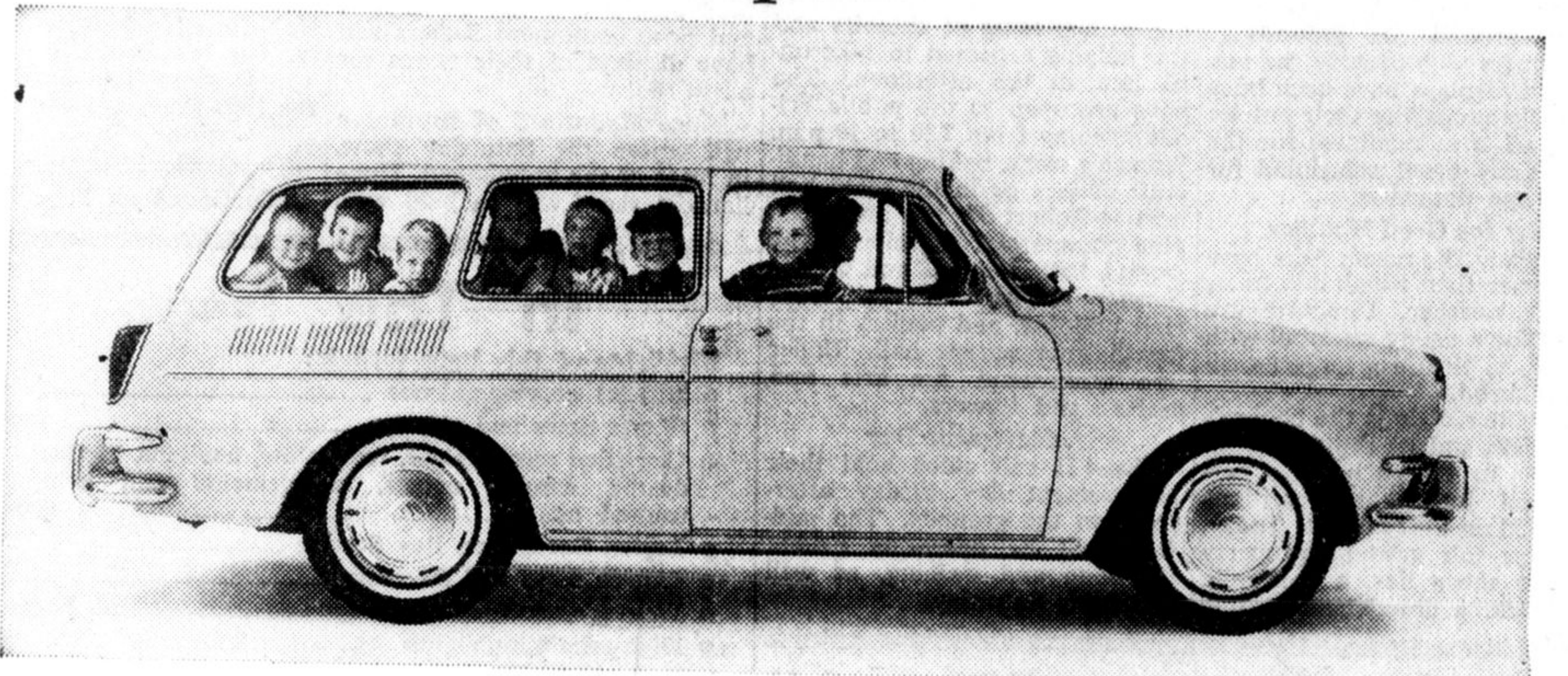
Frances Twiss read an article "How to have a Good Garden"
