

Midgets Drop Key Game Lodge Official Protest

Milton Midgets dropped a close 9-8 decision to Stoney Creek on Saturday in O.B.A. Midget "B" semi-final action, but the game is being protested. Milton officials Dave Brush and Chuck Gervais protested the game because the umpires allowed a Stoney Creek runner to advance from second to third following an overthrow foul on a ball. From third the runner scored on a passed ball and it proved to be a key tally. If Milton should lose the protest, they would be eliminated from O.B.A. play. If they win the protest, the replay of the game would probably take place on Saturday.

Milton nicked Stoney Creek's starting pitcher for three runs off four hits and a walk in the first inning, but in the bottom half of the inning Stoney Creek got to Milton starter Roger Wildfong for three hits and two runs. Craig Brush then came in and walked two more batters and forced in a run, before retiring the side.

Stoney Creek surged into the lead in the second frame on a two run home run over the short left field fence and in the third Milton regained the lead by scoring four times on four hits and a walk.

In the bottom of the seventh

Stoney Creek scored twice to tie the count at 7-7 and in the eighth Roger Wildfong homered to put Milton in front once more.

In the last of the ninth the first man up singled and the next batter doubled to score a run.

He was however, picked off trying to stretch his hit to a triple. The next batter popped out and then came another disputed play. In attempting to field a long hit to centre field Ed McLeod deflected the ball and it went through the fence. He retrieved the ball and the relay was in time to cut the runner off at the plate, for the third out. However the umpire ruled a ground rule double and this left the man on second and he then scored on a wild throw to first base, for the winning run.

Mohawk Accident Kills Veteran Sulky Driver

Halton County coroner Dr. G. E. Syer has called an inquest for Monday, following the death of veteran sulky driver Wilbert Hopkins of Milton who was killed in a four horse pile-up at Mohawk Raceway on Saturday evening. The 50-year-old native of Saskatchewan suffered skull and neck fractures and internal injuries when he was tossed from his sulky while driving Armbr Eclipse in the sixth race Saturday.

Mr. Hopkins, who lived in a trailer at the Milton fair grounds with his wife, worked with trotters for several area owners and also trained Canadian Intrusion, a notable winner, for the MacKinnon Brothers of Owen Sound. Funeral service was held on Tuesday from McKersie Funeral Home, Milton, with interment at Lakeview Cemetery, Meaford.

He was driving Armbr Eclipse in the sixth race when his sulky collided with the cart of Lynden Alex whose horse had broken and then sprawled on the track. Witnesses said Mr. Hopkins was tossed from his cart and landed on his head. The horses were approaching the stretch when Lynden Alex, driven by Almer Holmes, went into a break and stumbled. Eagle Armbr, following closely behind, crashed into the fallen cart and Armbr driver Harold McKinley was tossed toward the middle of the track.

Stoney Burke, driven by Renald Filion, collided with the tangle and he was tossed near the rail. Reports indicated that Mr. Hopkins had no chance to avert the pile-up and he was thrown over his own horse. The other drivers involved were uninjured. This is the first fatality at

Mohawk since it opened last year. A crowd of 5,407 witnessed the fatality on Saturday, including Mr. Hopkins' wife, Phyllis.

The inquest will be held 2 p.m. Monday at the new Halton County Court House Cpl. J. Parkinson and Const. L. Kneale of Milton O.P.P. were the investigating officers.
