

Sept. Vows at Hornby

The church was decorated with pink and white gladioli, white mums and ferns. The white satin bows on the pews were accented with pink gladioli flowers. The white candles in the candelabra were lit for the occasion.

The Rev. Jern Hill of Galt officiated, assisted by the Rev. E. S. Linstead of Hornby. At the 3.30 p.m. double-ring wedding ceremony, Sacrament was also served.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, chose a white gown of faille taffeta with long lily-point sleeves and Italian scoop neckline. Fragile Chantilly lace worked into a lattice effect punctuated by tiny bows, centered the controlled skirt, with scalloped lace edging also on the detachable train. A bouffant hand-rolled veil of silk illusion held in place by a pearl headpiece trimmed with pearls, completed her ensemble. She carried a mauve orchid, gardenias, stephanotis and ivy.
