Debate Variety of Tropics

J. McGeachie Named Urban Bd. Secretary

Jack McGeachie, clerk-administrator of Acton, was named secretary to the North Halton Urban Board last week, taking over a position vacated by the death this summer of Milton's clerk-administrator Jim Costigan.

Mr. Costigan had served the Urban Board for several years prior to his sudden death. The Board comprises councillors from Milton, Acton and Georgetown, who meet monthly to discuss mutual problems of municipal government.

Variety of Topics

During the September meeting Wednesday evening of last week, members from the three towns held discussions ranging over a wide variety of subjects — including centennial projects, high school budgets, auditoriums, loitering by-laws, new subdivision services, street lighting, annexation, and the Ontario Municipal Association.

In the discussion on centennial projects, Georgetown members

announced they had offered \$80,000 to purchase the former Cedarvale Girls' School for a public park and community centre program. Acton delegates noted they are pursuing a new library as a centennial project, estimated to cost about \$40,000; while Milton members reported they have applied for grants on a \$20,000 project that will convert the mill pond in central Milton into a public park site.

Auditoriums

Milton councillors, faced with a request for an auditorium at the Martin St. school that the public school board wants to convert into a senior public school, asked what auditoriums are avail-

able in the other towns. Georgetown has six public and separate schools, with one auditorium and one to be erected next year. The Acton delegates reported two schools with one auditorium, and the high school has a combined gym and auditorium. In Milton there are four public and separate schools, with no auditorium.

High school budgets came under fire, when members reported little or no control over high school expenditures, and budgets that arrive too late in the spring. A general discussion was also held on the various standards of education that seem to exist throughout the province, and differences were noted in the stand-

ards of schools in different towns right here in Halton.

Loitering, Apartments

Loitering by-laws were discussed, in light of the recent plaza problems that were besetting police. Georgetown members wondered if other towns had much control over basement apartments, and noted they recently had one single family dwelling that was occupied by 35 people at one time.

The Board scored the Ontario Municipal Board's attitude toward annexations, and suggested it would be easier if a local municipality wishing to annex more land could obtain information

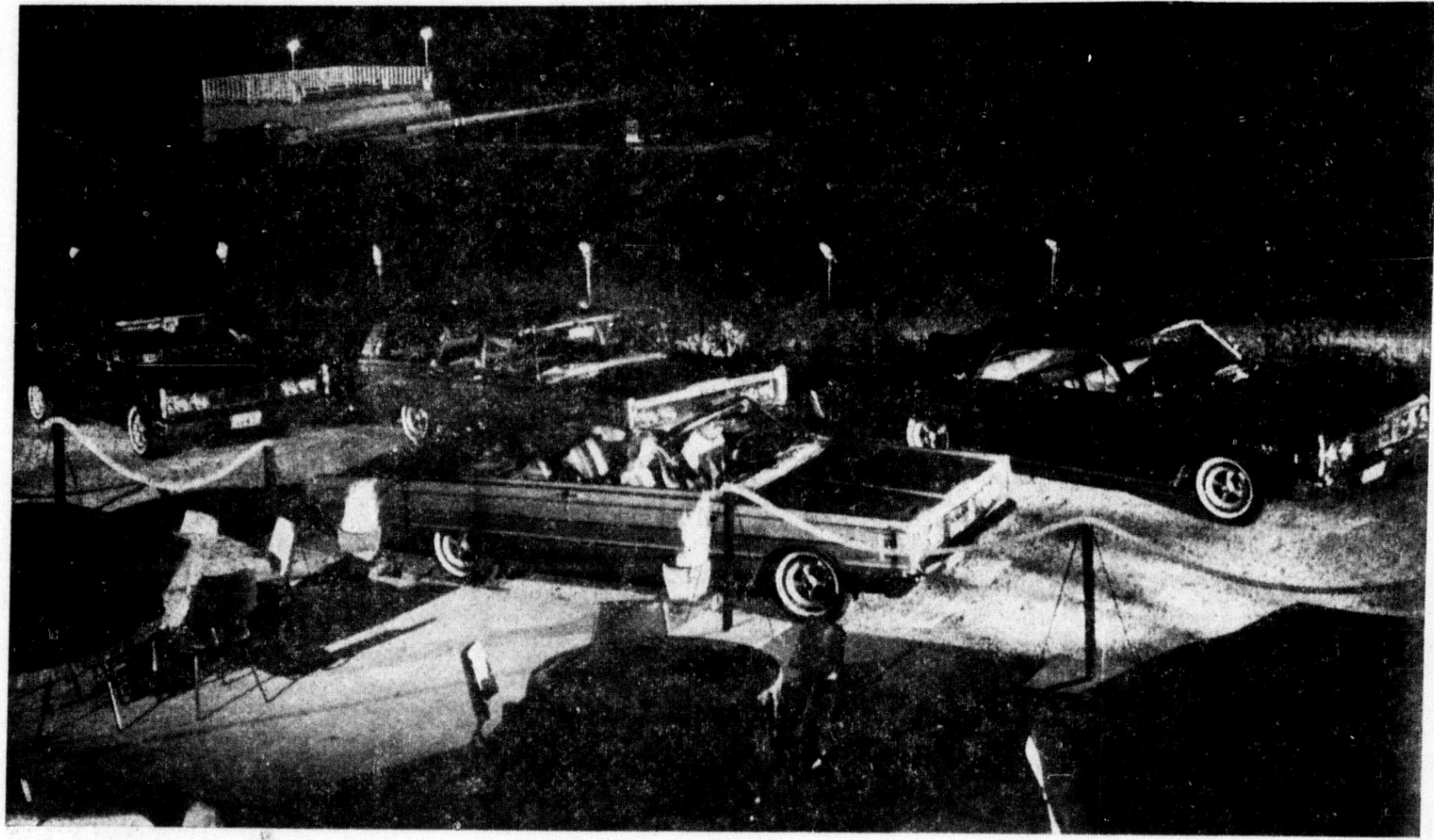
and assistance from the O.M.B., rather than having to fight it.

O.M.A. Director

Acton Mayor Les Duby reported he had been named one of six directors of the Town and Village Section of the Ontario Municipal Association, and would be visiting fellow councillors in Milton and Georgetown to explain the benefits of the association.

At the conclusion of the meeting, it was suggested the three councils should take a "busman's holiday" some time and visit with neighboring councils to see how they operate. No definite dates were set for exchange visits.

The week at leadership training camp was designed to prepare these young people to assume more responsibilities, both other community activities.

United Nations Tour
This week, September 20 to 26, the United Nations tour is being

held. One Junior Farmer from each county travels to Niagara Falls, to Gettysburg, Beltsville, Maryland, Washington, and to New York, with the highlight being a tour of the United Nations.

Aileen Harrop, R. R. 2, Norval, has been chosen for this trip to represent Halton County. Aileen has completed nine 4-H Homemaking Clubs and is president of the Norval Junior Institute.

Bill Marshall, R. R. 1, Milton, is Halton's representative on the Junior Farmer soil and land use tour. Farms throughout Dufferin, South Simcoe, Grey and Bruce counties will be visited September 21 to 24 under the guidance of the Crops Science Department, O.A.C., Guelph.

Bill has been an active 4-H member, and is this year leader of the Halton 4-H Corn Club.



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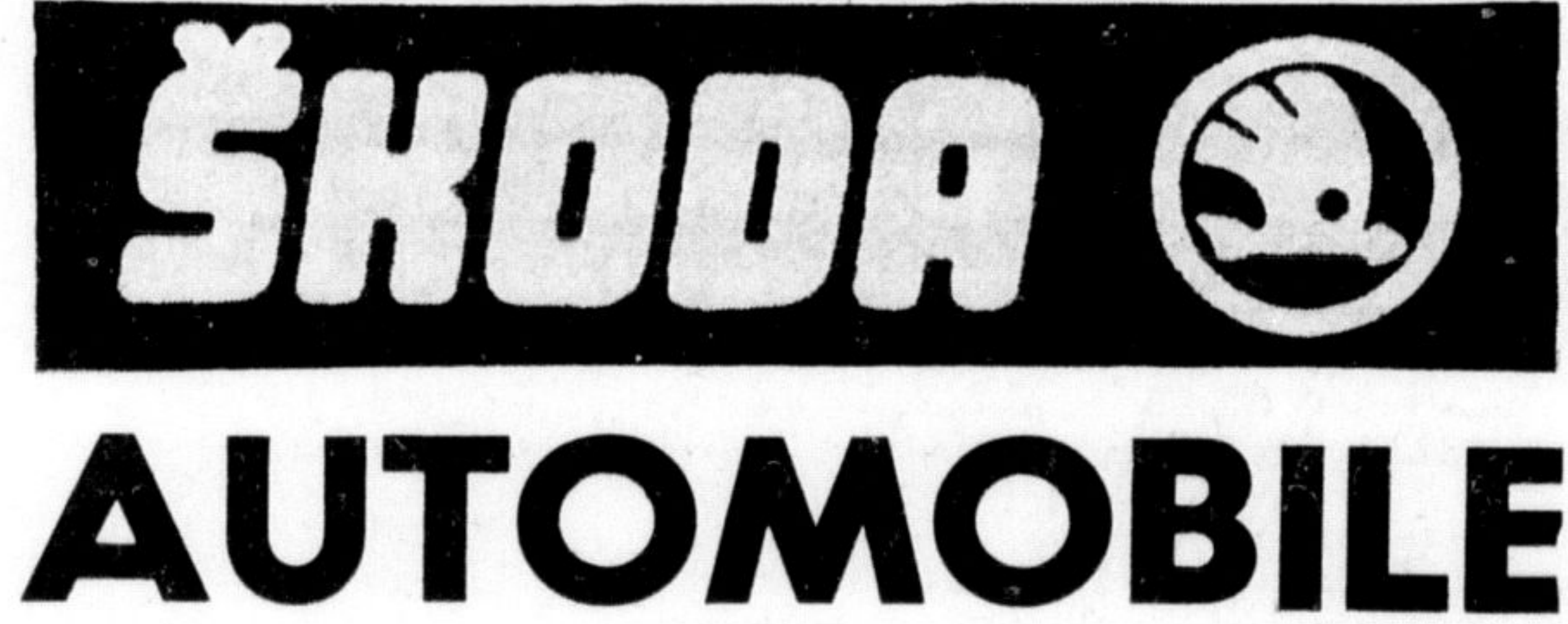
