(a) An interesting experiment for the area schools to attempt during Fall Fair time would be to award a trophy or similar reward for the school obtaining the highest number of points during the fair.

(b) Any community project,

no matter how large or small, is always in need of publicity. Our school can support this belief by displaying posters advertising it.

(c) An award could be given for the best poster in this group. The Fair is only one project that trains young people to become "Good Citizens".
