Ask \$2000 Bed Increase In County Hospital Grant

The Board of Governors of Joseph Brant Memorial Hospital, Burlington, submitted a brief to County Council on Thursday and requested an increased grant of \$2,000 per bed for a proposed 272 bed extension to present hospital facilities.

Night Fire

A deserted house on property owned by Cecil McCann at the corner of Highway 25 and 10 Sideroad was nearly gutted by fire Monday evening.

Fire Chief A. E. Clement reported the fire was extinguished but the roof and most of the interior of the building was destroyed.

The building was used to store hay for cattle pastured in the adjacent fields. Water was pumped from Sixteen Mile Creek to extinguish the night blaze.

The owner reported he had not been in the house that day, and said trespassers must have started the fire, as there was no electricity in the building. He reported he carried a bit of insurance on the building.

bed extension to present hospital facilities. The brief submitted by the Board of Governors stated, "all of the existing hospital facilities in the County were built when the financial assistance given by the County amounted to \$6,000 per bed. Since then and despite the protest of the Halton Hospitals Council, the financial assistance figure has been limited to \$4,000 per bed."

The board of Governors stressed that Council should consider re-amending their "present by-law so as to provide that grant assistance for hospital construction be restored to the rate of \$6,000 per active treatment bed." Council referred the matter to the Finance and Legislation and By-Law Committees.

Presently there are 228 beds at the Joseph Brant Memorial Hospital and according to hospital estimates, by the end of 1964 there will be a need for 292 beds, or 64 beds more than is presently available. If the hospital is enlarged to 500 beds, this would adequately cover increase estimates until 1970 at least. Total cost of the proposed addition would be \$5,440,000.

BAKED PEARS WITH MARSHMALLOWS

Quick Oven Dessert
 6 Canada Choice Canned Pear Halves
 1 tablespoon sugar
 1/4 tsp. cinnamon
 1 lemon, sliced paper thin
 6 marshmallows

Place drained pear halves in a baking dish with 1/3 cup of their juice. Mix sugar and cinnamon together and sprinkle over pears. Place a paper-thin slice of lemon on each pear half and a marshmallow on top of the lemon slice. Place in a moderately hot oven (400 degree F) for about 5 minutes or until marshmallows are delicately browned and pears are heated through. Serve immediately pouring the juice left in the baking pan over the pears. ● Agreed to invite members of the Milton Planning Board to a meeting next week to discuss a recent strongly-worded letter from that Board.

● Agreed to advise three residents on Martin St. they would be responsible for costs of rezoning if this was proceeded with. The houses are presently zoned industrial. Costs were estimated at \$150 each.

● Agreed to the installation of a storm sewer from Mary St. to Main St. to serve the drain at the rear of the recently built stores at the corner of Charles and Main. Mr. W. Ollen is to bear half the cost of part of the installation.

● Heard reports of further complaints that garbage was being dumped on the weekend at the sanitary land fill site. The foreman was authorized to erect gates and lock them at the three entrances from Williams Ave. and Parkway Dr. Cost of the fence, gates and locks was estimated at \$350. It was also reported about 27,000 yards of fill was to be obtained from the construction at the Ontario School for the Deaf and this would ease the compacting and covering of the garbage.

● Construct Pump House — Accepted the plans and specifications for construction of the pump house at the Kelso well site and agreed to investigate pump specifications for the pump between the surge tank and transmission line. Application to the Department of Municipal Affairs for assistance under the loan provisions was to be filed.

is still a dump and it is bound to have an influence on your property and upon your desire to live there."

Assessor John Charlton reviewed for the court, that the land was slated for parkland but when the town tried to make a ball park in the field, the ground was too soft and boggy to work on. It was decided a year ago to use the land for sanitary land fill, and in a few years time a good surface would be available to make it into a park.

Clean and Tidy

The Court went to visit the properties in question, and found little smoke and no uncovered garbage at the site. County assessor Ford Rogers agreed there

was nothing unsightly about the property, and pointed out the Town of Milton was doing everything to keep the property neat and tidy.

It was pointed out the garbage is not just dumped there, but kept covered and packed down.

The Court also noted the properties on which appeals were registered, were assessed rather low in comparison to most properties in the town. The four appeals were denied.

Members of the Court of Revision were R. D. Fleming of Burlington as chairman, John Blair of Burlington, Alec Near of Nasagawewa and George Fish of Oakville. Col. G. O. Brown of Georgetown was absent through illness.

With the Christmas period approaching, the Canada Post Office urges the public not to delay posting parcels to friends and relatives overseas. The public is cautioned to mail as early as possible. Last minute postings, if general, might render it impossible for the Post Office to find sufficient accommodation on the last steamers leaving in time to ensure Christmas delivery. Check the list of mailing deadlines at the local Post Office.

Generally, letters and parcels to Britain should be mailed by November 28 for surface mail; December 13 for air mail. Letters for Europe should go by November 6 and parcels November 18 for surface mail; letters December 10 and parcels December 12 via air mail.

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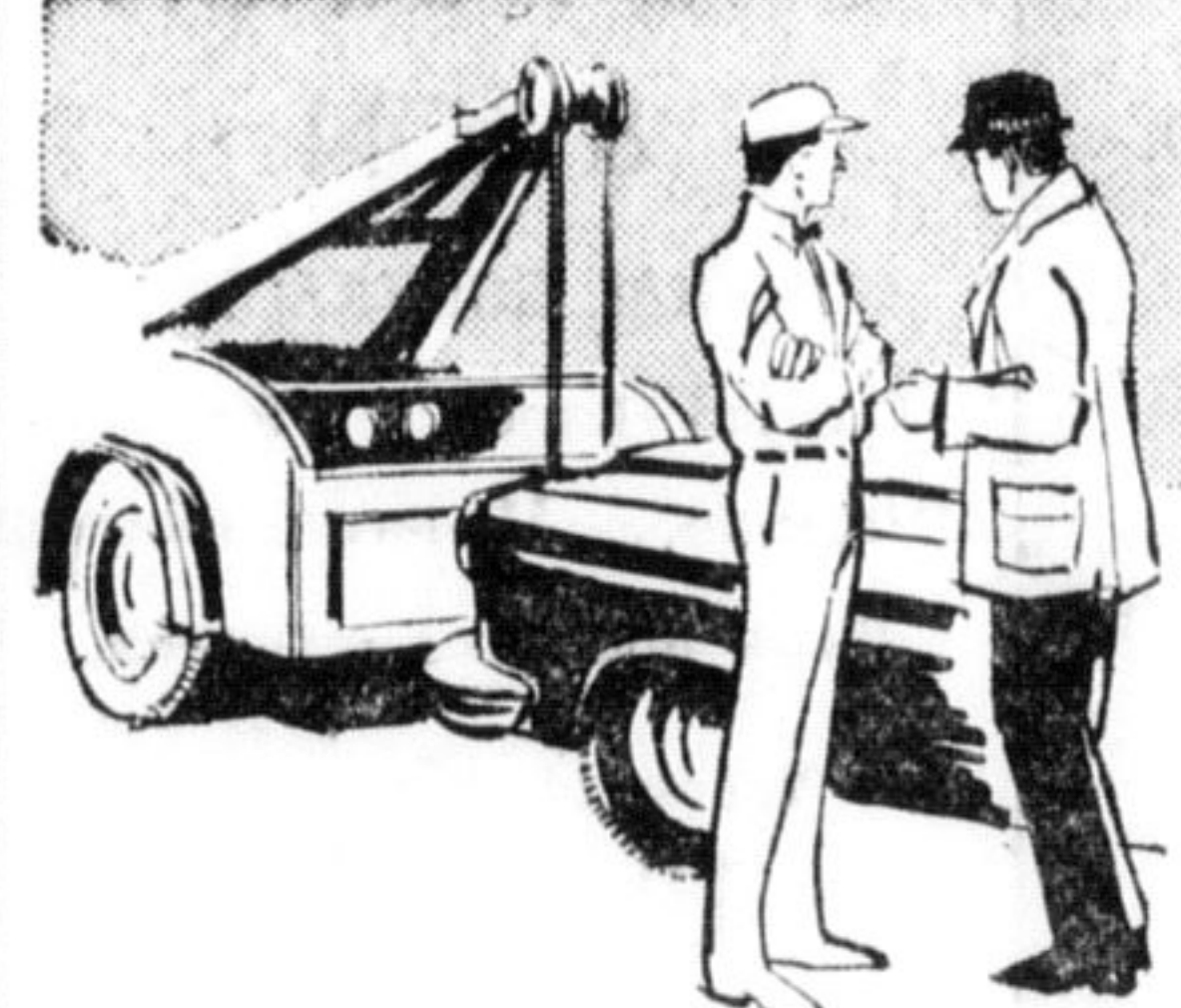
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
