St. Luke Subject of Sermon Many at 50th Anniversary

Dr. Dustan's choice of Scripture lessons was Psalm 122 and a portion of Chapter 3 of the Second Epistle to Timothy.

He gives us a picture of Christ as seen through the eyes of a Greek and a Gentle.

Christians can learn at least three ways in which to resemble Luke. Each of us can strive to be a good friend, a good physician by bringing healing to our nation and the world, and a good evangelist.

Assessment Up

Esquering Population 6,885

During 1964, the Esquering assessment went over the ten million dollar mark, Assessment Commissioner Art Benton revealed to Esquering Council last week. The assessment now is \$10,309,215, an increase of \$504,238 over last year, or an increase of 4.9 per cent.

The population too, has increased. It now stands at 6,885, an in-

crease of 187 over last year.

As Esquering becomes less rural the percentage of farm land has decreased, there is 42.97 per cent farm land, 37.01 per cent residential, and 20.02 per cent industrial and commercial.

A motion was passed allocating Esquering's Centennial grant to Halton County for the Museum Board, since Esquering plans no centennial project of their own.

"If we give it to the County it's fair", opined Councillor G. Currie, "everybody benefits, if we give it to one municipality the others would be mad" he added. Georgetown had asked that it receive it, if Esquering was not using it.

At first Councillor W. Linham proposed dividing it three ways, between Acton, Milton and Georgetown, however, he finally agreed with Councillor Currie that allocating it to the County was the fairest method.

An unusual request from a Doverscourt Road, Toronto man provoked some discussion. He wanted to purchase rocky stone lying on the roadsides in Esquering.

"He's very honest anyway", commented councillor Currie, "Most just take it".

"If we legalize it by selling it", thought councillor H. Lawson, "then if it is left amess, the ratepayers will blame us".

It was finally agreed it was too much trouble for all that was involved, so a letter will be written to him, telling him to make any deal he wants with the adjacent land owners.
