Let's Play Bridge

I imagine that all of you, at one time or another, have ended up in what appeared to be a hopeless contract. The world's best bridge players occasionally end up in the wrong contract. The difference between the experts and you and I is that they don't do it as often.

One thing to remember when you get into a bad contract is — don't despair. You must still make a plan of play and do your best to minimize a bad situation. When you make your plan assume that the cards are as favorably distributed as possible. Also remember that the opponents don't know what you have.

Here is a hand that occurred last week. South ended up in a bad contract but still managed to come up with a good score. Dealer, South North-South Vulnerable.

South had to stretch his values a bit to make a jump shift to two spades. When North bids three clubs, South does not have the additional values to go on. However, in spite of what many people think, the time to gamble a little is when you are vulnerable and the opponents are not. Hence South gambles on three no trumps.

West opens with the heart four and dummy goes down. South must be disappointed. North's bidding has been correct but his hand is really of little use to South in a no trump contract.

First good news comes when East plays the heart nine. South wins with the queen and considers his plan. Clubs must break favorably. Perhaps two tricks in diamonds and two in spades—but don't let the opponents in.

Well here goes—Clubs ace and East drops the queen. Three more club tricks follow including a finesse of West's 10 of clubs and he lets go of the heart 10, a small diamond and a small spade. Now declarer leads a low diamond from dummy. East ducks so far as he can tell, if he plays the king, he could set up all of dummy's diamonds. Now a diamond back to the ace. At this point declarer is home free. He knows that West has no more diamonds or clubs. A heart is lead from dummy. West makes four heart tricks but must finally lead spades to give South nine tricks and his contract.

So, when you get in a poor contract, don't despair, play confidently and, who knows, you may make your contract.
