Ladies Watch Dairy in Operation Hear Interesting History of Firm

The November meeting of the Scotch Block Women's Institute was held at the home of Mrs. Sam Harrop. The president was in charge. The Ode was sung and the Mary Stewart Collect was repeated. After the usual reading of the minutes and reports, the business was transacted.

Arrangements were completed regarding the next card party in Ligny Hall on November 25. These card parties are to be held once a month during the winter months. In late December there will be an added attraction at the card party. The ladies have been very busy quilting a beautiful applique quilt, and it will be drawn for that night. Tickets for the quilt were distributed the day of the meeting.

The family night when the ladies entertain their husbands and families is to be held December 12.

Tour Dairy
Mrs. Harrop, convener for Agriculture and Canadian Industries, made arrangements for the ladies to tour the Park Farm Dairy. Doug Pickett explained the use of all the equipment and demonstrated how the cardboard milk container was filled, closed and sealed by machinery.

After the interesting tour everyone returned to the house and Mrs. Harrop gave the following history of Park Farm Dairy:

Park Farm Dairy originated in 1929 because of the unsatisfactory price received for milk in Toronto. Raw milk being sold at that time, pasteurization was in the talking stage. The following year it was introduced for a more uniform and safer product.

subject. For the finale Hello Dolly was converted to express the casts farewell.

The output increased in the next 20 years to 500 quarts a day, delivered by one man with a horse and wagon.

The dairy was then sold to Gordon McIntosh in 1949 because it became too much work to run it as well as the farm, and labor was difficult to keep. A homogenizer was installed, giving an even textured product, also stainless steel tanks. Park Farm Dairy increased with the building boom in the town and had to be moved to a larger site. The present building, now located on the south side of the Base Line was built in 1957 and delivery is being made in quart, 2 quart and 3 quart containers, plus butter, cottage cheese, eggs and orange juice.

Bought by Farmers
The dairy changed ownership again in 1964, being purchased by four farmers and operated by manager Doug Pickett. Doug has been with Park Farm before E.

Harop sold it to Gordon McIntosh. The dairy, serves a large area including the town proper and Hornby, Campbellville and Milton Heights with a fleet of four trucks. Milk is taken also to a number of schools for noon lunches. After this informative article the meeting was closed by the Institute Grace and the Queen. A delicious lunch of sandwiches and relishes was served by the ladies in charge for the afternoon.
