



## SPORT LITES

A HARDROCK 16-YEAR-OLD with a penchant for penalties was the most colorful Dundas performer on Friday night and according to hockey legends, the hard-hitting youngster is an honest chip off a tough old block. Not too many years ago, a hulking, near-sighted rearguard patrolled the blue lines for the New York Rangers, Chicago Black Hawks and Detroit Red Wings, properly earning the title of a "real tough guy". Milton Merchant Junior coach, Enio Scisizzi remembers the defenceman simply as "Radar" Reise and on Friday night 400 Junior hockey fans had an opportunity to see Reise the younger in action.

Reise Jr. certainly wasn't the best player on the ice Friday, but he did attract considerable attention, especially on his five trips to the penalty box. Like his father, he's a real tough performer and this type of player usually sits out a good portion of every game cooling his heels.

Enio only played one season in the N.H.L. with Reise Senior, but he recalls some rather frightening trips from Sault Ste. Marie to Detroit with Radar behind the controls. As good a hockey player as he was, (and Enio says he was "great") Reise had one big handicap — real bad eyes. Enio reports that off the ice Radar used to wear "real thick glasses", and he recalls racing from the Sault to Detroit with Radar driving a brand new Kaiser and "hugging the white line, because it was the only thing he could see".

Milton's Ross McKersie is having a successful season with the Brampton Seven-Ups. . . . In his first four games, he picked up a goal and three assists. . . . The addition of Leon Stickle to the Milton Merchant line-up should have a strengthening effect. . . . Leon, who left town to try-out with the Chicago Black Hawk's farm club in Sarnia, was a late cut from the squad and returned to town last weekend. . . .

A report in The Champion last week that appeared to question a referee's decision, was in turn questioned this week by Cliff Houston, an official with no mean credentials. ## Merchants Top Dundas Capture Third Victory

Defenceman Merv Fletcher's bullet like drives from the blue line and classy performances from line-up newcomers Bruce McDuffe and Dave Prentice boosted the Milton Merchants to their third win of the season on Friday night as they out-skated, out-bumped and out-performed Dundas to gain a 7-5 verdict. Approximately 400 attended the game.

Sharp passing combinations and hard hitting from the defencemen, continually confused the Valley Town representatives. Despite out-playing Dundas by a considerable margin in the first frame the Merchants could manage only a 3-3 tie as the period came to a close. In the second stanza however, the locals scored three unanswered markers to go ahead 6-3 and in the final period a Roger Wildfong tally capped the scoring.

Former Milton Pontiac Juvenile star Bruce McDuffe was in uniform Friday for the first time this year and he picked up a goal and two assists. Dave Prentice, an import from Oakville, scored twice for Milton.

Jim Keane tipped in a pass from Roger Wildfong to open the scoring in the first period. Joe Hore combined with McDuffe and Alan Reid to make it 2-0 and Prentice teamed with McDuffe to make it 3-0 at 7:28. Dundas goals from Rooney, Schiltbus, and James tied the score before the end of the period.

Prentice counted his scored marker of the evening at 1:50 of the second stanza as he tipped in a pass from Paul Legree. Six minutes later Merv Fletcher unleashed a scorching drive the blue line that the netminder hasn't seen yet Jim Keane picked up the assist. Bruce McDuffe closed out the scoring for the period at 15:45 on a pass from Joe Hore.

### Back-Up Man

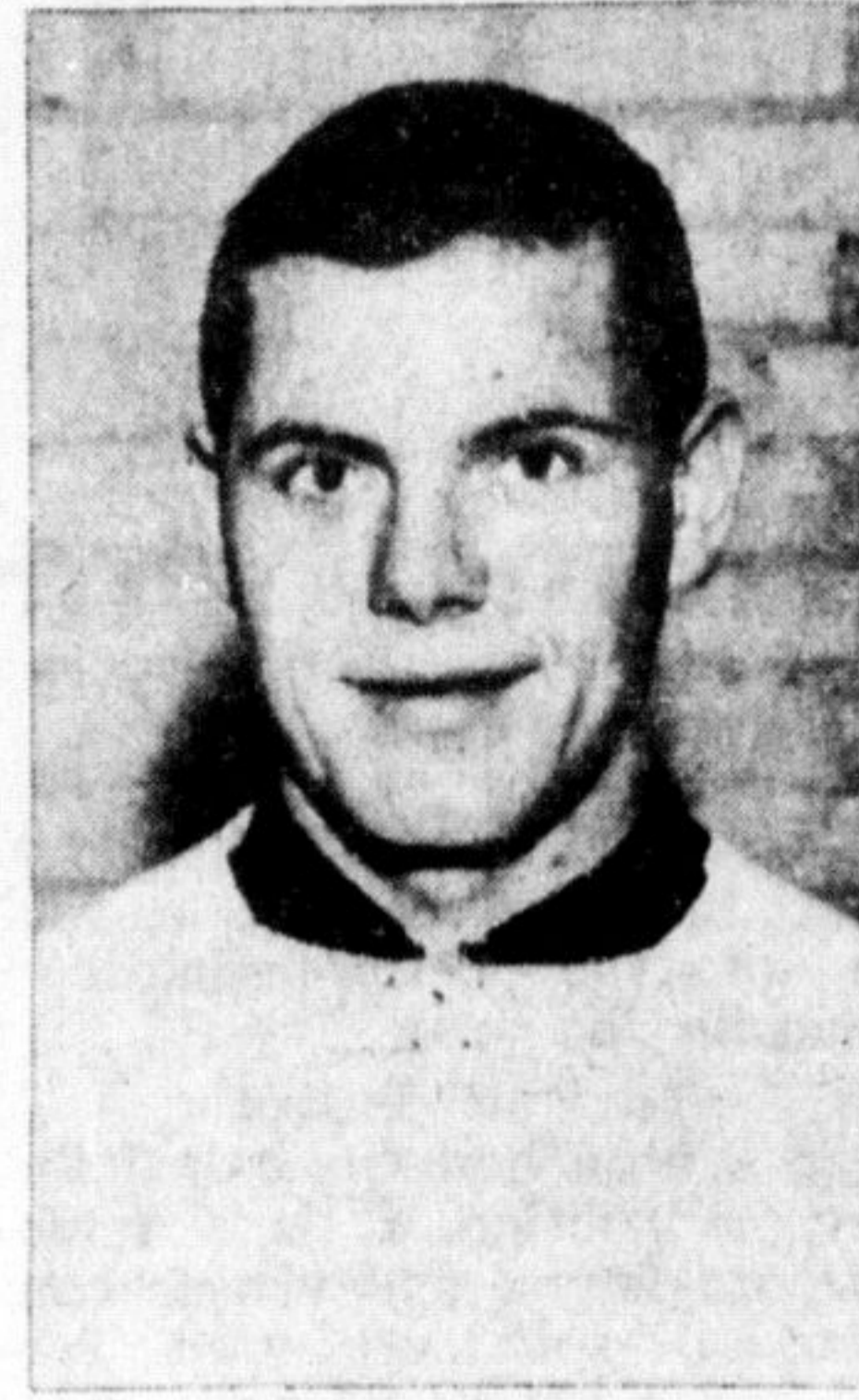
