Funerals Fill Need Says Rotary Speaker

Pointing up the logic of present day funerals, Wills Ruscoe, manager of the Canadian Embalmers Supply Co., told members of the Rotary Club of Milton, today's funerals fill an emotional need in the living and permit those who are left to pay their final tribute.

He suggested, in his address to Rotarians last week, the present day funeral better equips relatives and friends to absorb their grief.

Discussing the cost of funerals, he noted the average cost of an adult funeral in Ontario is \$574 and this covers funerals that range from \$200 to over \$2,000. The price on a casket includes countless other services as well as the casket, he emphasized, including such things as preparation for burial, notices, cemetery arrangements and a multitude of other things including the use of a funeral home.

Embalming includes disinfecting, preserving and cosmetology, the speaker explained as he emphasized the need for each. "Embalming makes sense and serves a useful purpose," Mr. Ruscoe concluded.

Mr. Basford, a native of Vancouver, explained how the British North American Act "has been brought back to Canada." He explained how amendments have been made to the Act giving the Federal Government limited power to amend the act and explain the "Fulton Formula".

Mr. Basford reported that the amendments to the B.N.A. act are actually a great milestone in the development of Canada as an independent nation. During his statements Mr. Basford charged, "Mr. Dietenbaker didn't have the guts to give Canada a flag and now all he does is beat while Mr. Pearson works for the good of Canada."

Capable Representative

John Mullally of King's, P.E.I., described Halton's M.P. Dr. Harvey as "a capable, energetic and respected member of the Parliament, the type of man we need in Parliament today." "He has contributed intelligently to Liberal programs and he has represented your County well," Mr. Mullally continued. The representative of King's compared the progress of the Liberal government to the "do nothing policies of the Conservatives", in the fields of International affairs, defense, trade and economic policies.

During a question and answer period, the three M.P.'s answered questions concerning the minimum wage law, pensions for school teachers, portable pensions and other problems that concern the nation as a whole. Noticeable by its absence however, was any question dealing with "flag".
