To Aid Blind

C.N.I.B. Head Chapter Speaker Shows Talking Book Machine

Mrs. Charles Anderson was hostess to the October meeting of the John Milton Chapter, I.O.D.E. Regent Mrs. D. E. Martin presided.

Minutes of the last meeting were read by secretary Mrs. R. Casse. Mrs. A. D. Mercer, Services at Home and Abroad secretary informed the members that wool would be purchased to knit socks for the Korean Welfare fund and requested any member able to knit these to get in touch with her.

Mrs. E. Clements, Empire and World Affairs Secretary spoke on the History of Canada from 1776 and gave a brief on the Fathers of Confederation.

Bursary Winners
Mrs. R. MacKay, Educational secretary read a bulletin from Provincial Headquarters informing members of the students that were helped to complete their education through the bursaries provided by the I.O.D.E. Chapters.

She also spoke on the new I.O.D.E. calendar that Michael Francis, a Micmac Indian is designing. Indian designs, illustrating legends from representative Canadian tribes, will be featured for each month.

Mrs. W. Rowney reported \$1,783 had been collected for the C.N.I.B. This is the largest sum received in Milton since the campaign started. A vote of thanks was extended for the Chapter to Mrs. Rowney for her work on this.

Mrs. G. F. Thompson introduced guest speaker Bill Lawson from the Hamilton Branch, C.N.I.B. He spoke on the development of C.N.I.B. across Canada. He noted that there are 85 blind persons in Halton County, and thanked the Chapter on the successful campaign.

He outlined the different services that they offer, including Occupational Therapy, Library Department, Adjustment Training program, and Counselling and Eye Bank of Canada.

There is a Vocational Guidance Department to help the pupils entering College. Free bursary grants from Universities enable them to complete their education, and he mentioned there are 69 Blind Students in Universities across Canada at the present time.

Talking Book
He demonstrated a tape talking book machine which has 21 hours of reading on tape. These are obtained from the C.N.I.B. library. Most tapes contain two books.

Mrs. Rowney thanked the speaker for his most interesting speech.

The meeting was closed with the singing of the Queen and Mrs. M. Rasberry and her committee served lunch.

Federal Loans Aid Burlington Sewage Project

Approval of federal government loans totalling \$116,920 to the Town of Burlington, to assist in the construction of two sewage treatment projects, was announced today by the Honorable John R. Nicholson, Minister responsible for the operations of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

Made under the terms of the National Housing Act, the loans for terms of 15 years each with interest at 5 1/2 per cent per annum, are as follows:

Dynes Row Sewage: Construction of 3,304 feet of 36 inch diameter sanitary trunk sewer; a loan of \$80,587 based on an

estimated cost of \$120,880.
Maple Avenue Sanitary Sewer: Construction of 1,550 feet of 33-inch diameter sanitary trunk sewer; a loan of \$36,333 based on an estimated cost of \$54,500.
This brings to seven the number of loans and to an estimated \$2,227,587 federal funds borrowed by the Town of Burlington to assist with its overall plan of pollution control.
