Order Speed-Up at Mountsberg Hurry Work on \$400,000 Dam

A speed-up in brush clearing at the site of the Mountsberg reservoir was ordered Nov. 19 by members of the Halton Region Conservation Authority.

It was explained the Authority is experimenting with various ways of clearing the property in preparation for a \$400,000 reservoir. A bull dozer with a rake tooth arrangement had been working well, clearing up to five acres a day, and Authority members ordered a second dozer on to the site.

Members learned much of the pulpwood and saleable logs were being salvaged for re-sale.

Dam for Skating
The Authority was asked by

Oakville Parks Board to go ahead with a 30 inch dam by Drumquin school so a skating pond could be provided for use by area residents. The work is one of several dam sites under consideration for the future.

Members agreed to exchange some land bordering Highway 401 at Kelso with a nearby farmer who owns some flood plain land. Oakville resident Martin Crutcher was granted an easement through the Trafalgar Flood Plain Land project, to drill a well.
