The Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire (I.O.D.E.) will celebrate its 65th birthday on Saturday, February 13. There are two Chapters of the I.O.D.E. in Milton, the John Milton Chapter which was organized in 1911, and the Sarah Martin Chapter which began in 1957.
The impact of I.O.D.E. work in the Order's 976 Canadian chapters is felt throughout the world as the organization raises over \$1,000,000 a year for education, emergency welfare and other worthwhile community services. One of the current projects is the \$50,000 Canadian Centenary Fund, through which a special education project will be undertaken in each province to commemorate Canada's 1967 centennial year.

The Sarah Martin Chapter has 24 members. Mrs. N. David Martin is president this year. Their meetings are held the second Thursday of the month. Their annual lawn party and Christmas tree draw are the major fund-raising events. Bulk of their funds are channeled into local and national education projects. This group also sponsors the Canadian Players Foundation plays in Milton.

Milton Police and the Milton O.P.P. detachment officers combed the Milton area for a missing car, following a hit-and-run accident on Highway 401 near town early Sunday morning. The car was finally located near Hornby and a Windsor area man was subsequently charged with failing to remain at the scene of an accident.
A van truck loaded with camera equipment was struck, and received \$1,000 damage. The driver told police the other motorist did not stop. When the other motorist was located, it was learned a passenger in the hit-and-run car was injured, and the car had \$600 damage.
The driver pleaded guilty in Magistrate's Court on Monday and was remanded in custody for sentencing.

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RECIPE OF THE MONTH
By the Ontario Tender Fruit Institute
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PLUM ROLY POLY
Serves 8 For a Snack or Dessert

- 3 cups biscuit mix
- 2 tablespoons melted butter
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 2/3 cup canned strained plums (or junior plums)

Prepare your own biscuit dough or use a prepared mix. Roll out in 15 x 10-inch rectangle. Spread with melted butter. Combine sugar and spices. Sprinkle 1/2 on biscuit mix. Spread with strained plums leaving a 1-inch margin. Sprinkle with remaining sugar and spices. Roll up and cut in 1-inch slices. Place slices, cut side up, in a greased pan or muffin tin. Bake in hot oven (450 F.) 15-18 minutes.

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
