Elections for the inter-plant committee of the United Auto Workers, Local 4970 at Ontario Steel Products, Milton, was held Wednesday of last week with the two top offices filled by acclamation, and spirited campaigns for all remaining offices.  
Martin G. Caputo, chairman of the committee for the past 10 years, was acclaimed to his 11th term with Robert Farrell acclaimed vice-chairman. Mr. Caputo was also named the District

Council Delegate to the Canadian section of the U.A.W. which meets every three months.  
Membership elected Allan Strath second vice-president, and Robert Farrell and Stan Callard alternate delegates to the District Council.  
Seven committeemen and seven alternates were named to the bargaining and plant grievance committee, with as many as five men running for the two seats allotted in some departments.

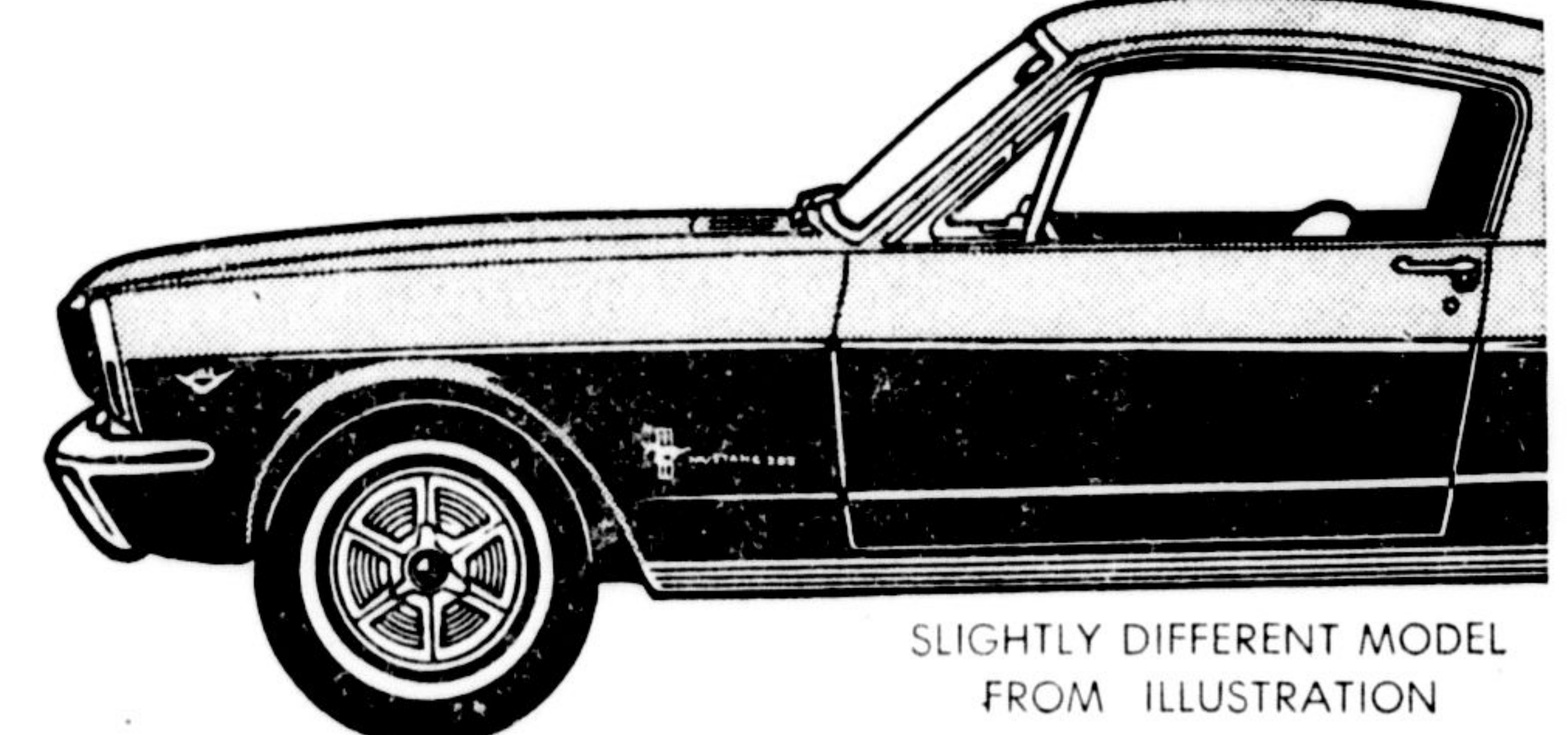
mitteeman.  
Named an election committee were George Purdy, Blackie Garton and Lyle Wallis.  
Today (Wednesday) Mr. Caputo and several other Canadian representatives of the U.A.W. left for Ottawa, where tomorrow they will meet with cabinet ministers to review the new reciprocal trade agreement and the remission of tariffs on auto parts. The group, including about 10 U.A.W. representatives and research directors from the Canadian Labor Congress, will be pressing for some protective measures to help smaller Canadian auto parts industries from being put out of business by larger U.S. firms.  
Mr. Caputo explained the delegation would also seek some aid for the older workers who might be displaced and unable to find new jobs, due to the government action in the tariffs problem. The delegation will represent about 80,000 Canadian workers.

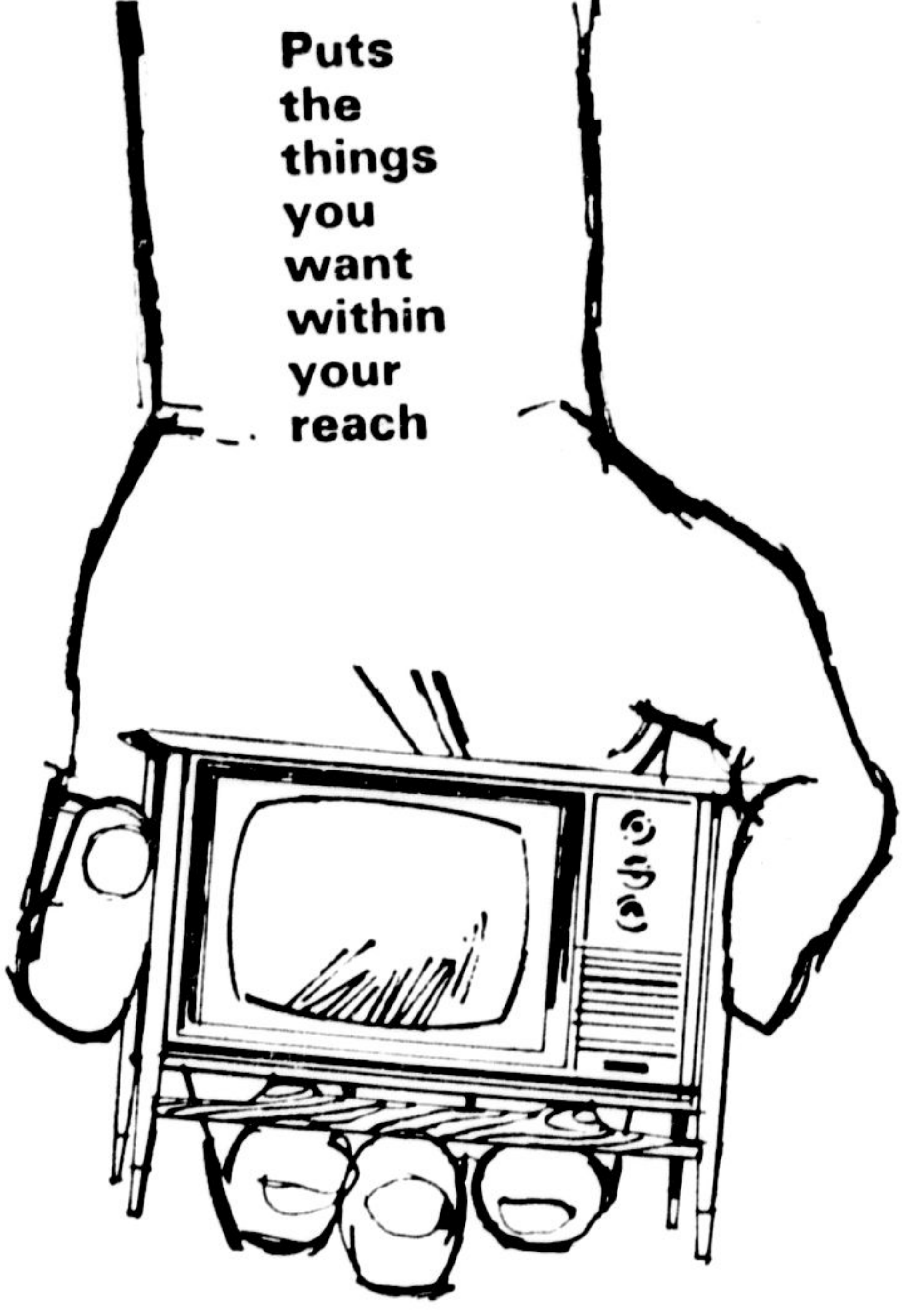
