## Merchants Fade in Final Frame Georgetown Wins Fifth Game 7-6

A third period fade-out on Wednesday literally buried the Milton Merchant Juniors as the Georgetown Beavers staved off elimination to win the third game of the best of seven series 7-6. More than 250 staunch Merchant supporters travelled to Georgetown for the contest and hoped for a Milton victory enabling their home town heroes to win the O.H.A. Junior "C" quarter final series.

Don Norton's goal with four seconds remaining in regulation time capped a Beaver come-back and gave them the victory. Going into the third period, Enio Sclicizzi's performers had a 6-4 lead but an injury to ace defence-man Paul Legree weakened the squad in the final frame. Legree was struck by a flying puck in the second period and went to the hospital for treatment for a bruised rib at the end of the period.

After out-shooting and out-playing their opponents in the first two frames, Milton went into a partial shell in the final stanza. At 7:05, Ron Lane denied the twine, to make the score 6-5 as the Beavers continually pressured the fading local contingent. Doug Selby's goal at 15:35 tied the count. The final five minutes of the contest were jam-packed with excitement as both teams missed several excellent scoring opportunities. With a minute and 20 seconds remaining, Dick Marshall broke in alone and Frank Cowbrough in the

Georgetown cage made a sparkling save on a waist high shot, to foil the Milton star. With less than a minute left, lumbering Beaver forward Bill Campbell let go with a wicked slap shot that ricocheted off the Milton goal post. However a face-off in the Milton end with less than 20 seconds left turned into a Georgetown goal as Norton lifted the puck over a sprawling Frank Marshiori to give the Hespelo village crew the win.

Milton marksmen in the contest were Bruce McDuffie, Roger Wildlong, Leon Stickle, Jim Keane, Paul Legree and Joe Hore. Defenceman Joe Hore's goal was a tremendous solo effort as he skated the length of the rink, deking Georgetown defenders and then breaking in alone to beat the goalie with a fine shift. Leon Stickle passed from his knees to set up Roger Wildlong's marker as the blond sniper caught the lower corner of the net with a blistering wrist shot. Jim Keane's goal came on a perfect pass-out from Brian Bond. Milton assists went to McDuffie, Wildlong and Stickle, two each, and Brian Bond and Bill Anderson one each.

Merchants drew first blood in the contest when McDuffie scored at the 47 second mark of the first period. Georgetown tied the count on a goal from Jan Popiel at 6:33 and then Milton scored twice to take a 3-1 lead at 17:44 Milton was caught with too many men on the ice and with the team short-handed Doug Selby scored for the Beavers to make it 3-2.

Hard working Bruce McDuffie set up Milton's first score in the second period as he dug the puck out from behind the cage and flicked it to rearguard Paul Legree who bulged the twine with a blistering slap shot. A Georgetown goal from Campbell at 6:50 narrowed the gap to 4-3 and then Wildlong scored to give Milton a two goal lead once again. Norton's first goal of the game at 13:28 brought the Beavers into contention once more and then at 18:45 Joe Hore scored on his solo rush to give Milton a 6-4 lead.

At the end of the second stanza Legree was taken to the hospital and in the Georgetown dressing room, coach Del Beaumont decided to change goalkeepers, vanking regular Bill Cuthbert in favor of substitute Frank Cowbrough. Both moves figured in the big final out-come of the contest.

Frank Marshiori played a strong game in the Milton cage and at times unbelievably good. Milton out-shot Georgetown 42-31. Officials called only six penalties in the contest, three to each team. Milton's third line of Alan Reid, Alain Bouchard and Dave Prentice saw only limited action in the final period.
