Finally, a letter from W.M.S. headquarters sought information on members' views concerning the eventual amalgamation of all Women's Church groups. In this connection, a meeting was to be held in the Church hall on Thursday March 11. Delegates from this group were Mrs. Denboer and Mrs. McIntosh.

Addresses were given to which members, as individuals, might send old copies of non-political magazines. These would be most welcome in Africa and Asia where Communist literature has made such a strong impact. Democratic publications to counteract this influence have been sorely lacking.

## Third U.C.W. Presbyterian Attended by 300 Delegates

Port Nelson United Church, Burlington, hosted the third annual meeting of Halton Presbyterian Church Women on Wednesday, March 3. Approximately 300 delegates representing 48 local assemblies for the morning session. Mrs. Earl Sovereign, Presbyterian president, and Mrs. M. C. Lowe, President of Port Nelson, extended greetings of welcome and Mrs. Frank Taylor, Hamilton Conference president, conducted the worship service using the theme "For the Love of Christ Controls Us", reading the 4th Chapter of 1st John.

Correspondence including greetings from neighboring Presbyterians as well as a letter regarding a resolution to be passed "to abolish the death penalty".

### Unites Women

All departments presented most encouraging reports in carrying out the purpose, "To unite all women of the congregation for total mission of the Church and to provide a medium through which they may express their loyalty and devotion to Jesus Christ, in Christian witness, study and fellowship and service." The fruits of labor cannot be measured by financial statements but it is interesting to note that the total sum of \$105,867.91 was raised for all purposes by a membership of 3341 members of the U.C.W. in Halton Presbyterian in 1964. \$23,233 was forwarded to Hamilton Conference for the Unified Budget Fund, \$168 for Conference expenses, \$814.66 Presbyterian Administration and \$3,015.92 as "Over and Above" gifts with the remaining portion spent on local church projects.

Mrs. H. R. Parker and several ladies from Applewood U.C.W. presented a skit, "How Long is Ever After?" as introduction to Year 2 New Curriculum study, "Jesus Christ and the Christian Life." Following a Literature presentation by Mrs. R. R. Bonsteel, luncheon was served by the ladies of Port Nelson.

The Canadian Red Cross is a member of the world wide organization known as the League of Red Cross Societies. This organization has as its motto, "Through Humanity to Peace".
