

# HARLEY...to HALTON

Since our last column, there has been little progress made in the field of legislation in Parliament. Several days were spent on the opting out legislation and the Conservative Opposition moved an amendment to refer the matter to another Federal-Provincial Conference. The government will resist this attempt as it feels this is unnecessary.

The report of the Canada Pension Plan Committee is now available in French and English, so the Canada Pension Plan has been proceeded with. However, no real progress has been made. The debate has lately almost exclusively been carried on by the Creditiste Members.

This is interesting because they are from Quebec and Quebec is not participating in the Canada Pension Plan as such. It is true that they will still be within the framework of the Federal plan, so that the pensions will be portable across all

of Canada. The plan will be the same in Quebec, but will be administered by and the funds used by the Government of the Province of Quebec.

A very amusing thing happened in the House of Commons the other day in relation to the French priority of reports. Mr. Gregoire, the Creditiste Member, asked the Liberal Chairman of the Committee on Privileges and Elections when he would move concurrence in the Committee Report (the report had cleared the R.C.M.P. of charges by Gregoire that they had manhandled him during his recent arrest and subsequent gaoing overnight for traffic offences).

**Need French and English**  
The Chairman reported that he wouldn't consider doing such a thing until the report was available in both French and English. So Gregoire was hoisted on his own petard.

The mood of the House of Commons at present, I would describe as surly. It is looking for trouble or perhaps the more accurate expression is that it smells an election. Whether this is likely or true, it is hard to say, but the Members of the Opposition sense the possibilities and become very political in their behaviour, which is, I suppose, usual behaviour under the circumstances.

**Progress Difficult**  
It does make progress in the House of Commons very difficult, as a great deal of time is spent debating and talking about
