Milton Council at its regular meeting on Monday:

- Received a report from the Ontario Water Resources Commission reporting on the operation of the sewage treatment plant. The report noted, "The final effluent was crystal clear and sparkling... inspection revealed a "zero coliform count."
- Authorized the mayor and clerk to attend a conference of the Ontario Municipal Association at Point Edward on May 7 and 8.
- Agreed to permit the distribution of plastic garbage bags through the Student Council at Milton District High School providing they would be handled at a maximum profit of 50 cents for 50 bags. The town would make the bags available to the students at the present over the counter price. The students would be permitted to deliver them and collect a profit.
- Endorsed a petition to the provincial government from the township of Saltfleet, calling for provincial grants toward the maintenance of police forces.
- Noted a hearing had been called by the Ontario Municipal Board to hear the appeal of Three Keys Developments Ltd. against a Milton Planning Board decision. The application was for a land separation that was denied by the local board. Date of the hearing was April 27 in the Milton Council Chambers at 10 a.m. Permission was granted the board to engage the town solicitor for the hearing.
- Gave three readings to the
- Approved a by-law granting Hydro Commissioners \$20 a meeting for a maximum of 18 meetings a year. The per diem rate for attending functions outside the town was also set at \$20 a day. The new schedule is retroactive to January of this year.
- Approved the purchase of an Underwood printing calculator and adding machine at a cost of \$500 and an I.B.M. electric typewriter at a cost of \$531 for use in the municipal offices. It was noted the purchases had been included in the budget.
- Was advised by Councillor G. Addison the Recreation Committee was still interested in acquiring the Armouries on Martin St. when it became available from the federal government. He asked that in preparation of the capital budget over the next five years, this be kept in mind.
- Agreed to ask police to assist in traffic direction on Sunday morning on Martin St. between 10.30 and 11 a.m. Councillor G. Addison noted it was a busy time and traffic was often backed up for a considerable distance.
- Acknowledged with thanks the Milton Rotary Club's inclusion of a letter from the Mayor in the program distributed at the Rotary Conference in Hamilton on the weekend attended by 1,000 from Ontario and New York state.
- Proclaimed Library Week and authorized erection of banners in suitable locations.

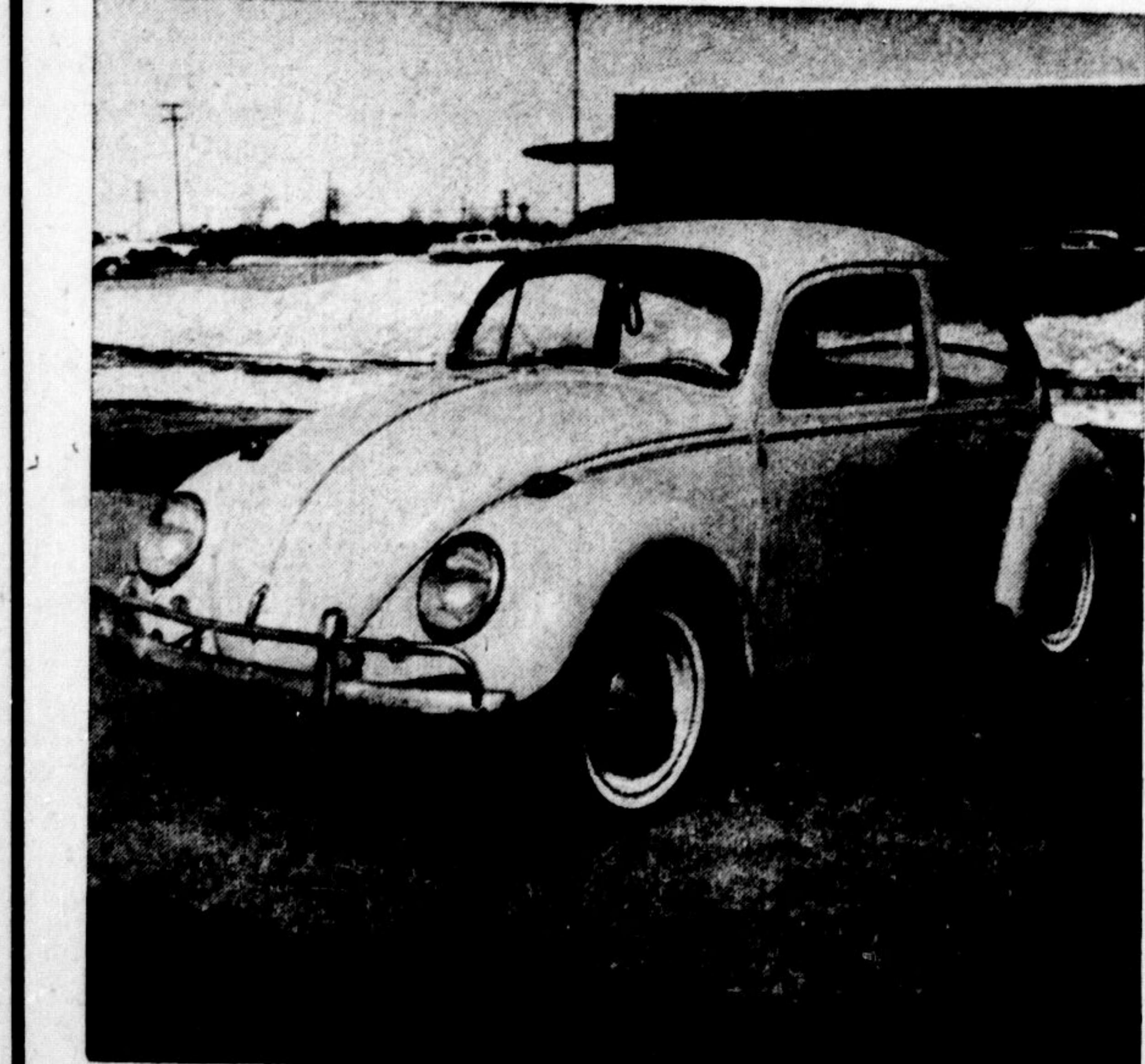
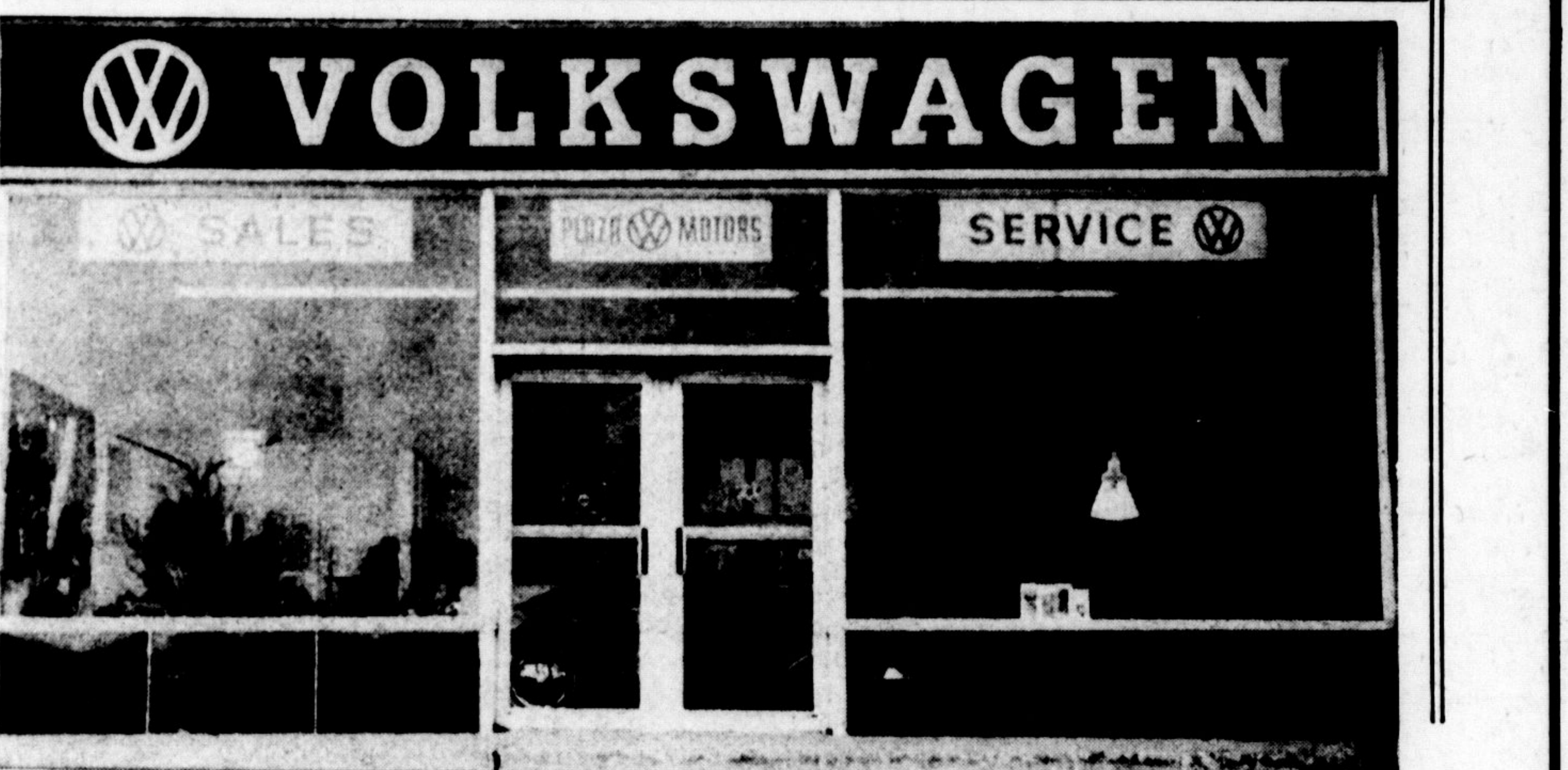
