

# Annual Juvenile Tourney Starts Saturday Milton Hosts 600 Happy Hockey Performers

More than 600 hooting, hollering, happy teenagers will soon start to file into town and test Milton's hospitality. It's Tri-County Juvenile Tournament time again and beginning Saturday morning, teams from all parts of the province will try their luck in the most popular Juvenile tourney in Canada.

For the first time ever, Milton will be hosting a week-long tournament and hockey bugs throughout the community are licking their chops. Forty-two exciting contests featuring possible N.H.L. stars of the future will lure an expected crowd of over 4,000, tourney officials report.

**Open Homes**  
Milton homes will be opened

to the players and team officials and it is expected nearly 140 persons will be accommodated through the generosity of town residents. Although the annual event will get underway bright and early at 8:30 Saturday morning, the official tournament opening will take place on Monday evening at 7 p.m. when Milton's Mayor S. G. Childs drops a puck. Luminares from nearly every corner of the hockey world are expected to attend and one of the main attractions will be the Toronto Marlboro Midgets, who perennially end up in the "A" division finals.

As in other years, there will be three divisions of play, "A," "B" and "C." Eight teams will take part in the "A" division,

while 12 teams will battle it out for both the "B" and "C" division crowns. Four games will be played on Saturday starting at 8:30 and ending at 12:30 in the afternoon. On Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evening, four games will be played each night, starting at 7 p.m. and ending at 11 p.m.

Friday, April 16, Good Friday, games will start at 8:30 in the morning and end at 10 in the evening. Saturday games will begin at 8:30 a.m. and starting at 1:30 p.m., the consolation championship games will begin. The divisional championship contests will be at 6 p.m. with the "C" final, followed by the "B" final at 7:15 and the "A" final at 8:30 p.m.

On Friday, the game rooms at the Royal Canadian Legion will be open for players to use the facilities. All boys will be supervised by their team officials.

## Two Minute Lapse

# Costs Juniors Series Opener

A lapse of less than two minutes in the third period cost the Milton Merchant Junior a victory in the opening game of their best of seven league final series with the Simcoe Blades. A Blade tally at 9:04 of the third period tied the score at 4-4 and rapid fire markers at 9:56 and 10:34 shoved the visitors into a lead that they never surrendered — going on to capture a 7-5 verdict.

Just over 900 fans turned out for the series opener and watched Enio Scisizzi's Merchants overcome a 2-0 first period deficit and go ahead 4-2 as the second stanza ended. The Blades, league leaders during the regular season, erupted for four goals in the third stanza to take a 6-4 lead and after Joe Hore scored for Milton, Bob Kowalsky fired a long shot into the empty Milton net to finish off the scoring in the fast paced contest.

Both teams skated in high gear and the fans were treated to some of the most interesting hockey of the season. As predicted by coach Enio Scisizzi, the Blades played it clean and only 11 penalties were called by officials Olinski and Sims. Simcoe players were sent to the box seven times.

Blade captain Wayne Neidrauer started the scoring at 4:50 of the first period on a pass from Gord Yuill. A dribbler from the stick of Bob Kowalsky skipped into the Milton cage at 12:51 to put the visitors in front by two but then the Miltonians started to have some success around the Blade net.

**Scramble In Front**  
With Yuill sitting out an elbowing penalty at 16:25, Leon Stickle banged in a loose puck from a scramble in front of the Simcoe cage. Linemates Bruce McDuffe

and Roger Wildfong gained assists on the play. Blade netminder Bill Allender was screened when Alan Reid's golf shot from just inside the blue line crossed the goal line to tie the score. Alain Bouchard and Dave Prentice drew assists.

High scoring Brian Bond put Milton in front for the first time in the game at 4:10 of the second stanza as he caught Allender napping, moved around from behind the net and slipped the puck into an open corner. Merchant captain Dick Marshall helped set up the play.

Blueline ace Joe Hore was responsible for the fourth Merchant marker as his sizzling slap shot from the point was deflected into the Simcoe cage by Alain Bouchard. The stocky Quebec native was stationed in front of the net and barely got hit stick on the puck to tip it into the goal. Dave Prentice was credited with an assist on the play.

A roaring crowd and a clever Merchant play added up to some confusion late in the period as Bruce McDuffe broke loose and skated in alone to beat Allender for what appeared to be Milton's fifth goal. The buzzer however, had sounded and the tally was disallowed.

**Take Advantage**  
With a two goal cushion going into the third stanza the locals tried to play a cautious game but a fired up Simcoe squad took advantage of every mistake. Initial fireworks in the period started at 4:14 when Gary Mitchell made good on a third rebound to reduce the Milton lead to 4-3. Jim McNally's screen shot tied the score at 9:04 and 52 seconds later Mitchell scored again, this time on a long backhand shot, to put the Blades in front to stay. John Forsyth's goal from behind

the net, patterned after Brian Bond's goal earlier in the game, put the Blades nearly out of reach but Scisizzi's skaters kept trying and at 17:30 Joe Hore weaved his way past Simcoe defenders to connect with a backhand shot and bring the locals close once again. Alan Reid and Alain Bouchard assisted.

In a final desperation move, goaltender Frank Marchiori was pulled for an extra attacker and with 34 seconds left Bob Kowalsky scored his second goal of the game to make it 7-5.

Despite the loss, Milton played a strong game and with a little more luck could have wound up with a victory. Frank Marchiori came up with some dazzling stops and robbed Simcoe players on at least three breakaways. The shots on goal record showed Marchiori with 33 stops, compared to 30 saves by Allender.

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1 lb. ground lamb  
4 strips of bacon  
1 tsp. salt  
¼ cup milk  
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4 or more peach halves  
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Mix ground lamb with salt, thyme or marjoram and milk. Shape into 4 oval patties. Score with handle of wooden spoon. Drain a can of Canada Choice canned peach halves. Arrange peach halves (hollows up) around lamb patties on broiler pan. Place 5 inches from heat and broil 12 minutes. Turn patties. Broil for 5 minutes longer. Fill centres of peach halves with mint jelly. Top each patty with bacon slice. Broil for another few minutes until bacon is done.

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
