For the second consecutive year, Pete Gates of Lowville has been elected to chart the baseball fortunes of the expanding Halton Rural Minor Softball Association. At a meeting in Boyne Community Centre on Tuesday evening, Mr. Gates was returned as president of the association and the 15 persons learned that at least 18 teams from six communities will participate in association action this summer.

Entries have been received from Hornby, Drumquoin, Omagh, Lowville, Kilbride and Moffat, and leagues will be formed for Squirts, Pee Wees, Bantams and Midgets. So far, five entries have

been received for both Squirt and Pee Wee divisions and four teams will take part in the Bantam games. Three Midget teams and a Juvenile entry will play in the Midget division.

Other members elected to the executive included first vice-president Ray Fuller of Omagh, secretary Mel Dolby of Omagh, treasurer John Wallace of Hornby and directors Jack Baynton of Moffat, Dave Leslie of Hornby and Gordon Harris of Kilbride.

The deadline for entering teams has been set for April 24 and it is expected the schedule will start in the first week of June.

Inspired St. Marys Team Downs Kinsmen Pee Wees

Inspired by a large crowd of cheering and jeering fans, the St. Marys' Pee Wees handed the Milton Kinsmen their first defeat in 12 O.M.H.A. "B" playoff games, by a score of 6-4 in St. Marys on Saturday. For the first time in their young hockey careers, the Kinsmen experienced the demoralizing effects of a partisan home town crowd.

Milton started off in high gear, scoring twice in the first 10 minutes. At 2:45, Nigel Ferguson put Jim Marshall in the clear for the first goal. Seven minutes later, Ray Tonelli hit Nigel Ferguson with a pass in front of the net and Nigel made no mistake as he buried the puck in the twine. Scott Graham got one goal back 30 seconds from the end of the period on a high deflected shot from the point.

Start Early

With the second period just 20 seconds old, Ken McCutcheon drove a shot from the blue line that Philip Bailey only got a piece of and the puck dropped into the net to tie the score. At

2:32, Norman Barr dribbled a shot through the defense that found its way into the corner of the Milton net, to give St. Marys a 3-2 lead.

Two minutes later, Milton got back on even terms on Nigel Ferguson's second goal from Ray Tonelli. St. Marys came back to add another goal to have one goal up at the end of the second period.

At 5:03 of the final period, Ken McCutcheon gave St. Marys a two goal bulge on a scramble from in front of the Milton goal. Milton protested the goal, to no avail, claiming a St. Marys player was in the crease. At the mid-point in the period, the Kinsmen moved back into contention as Gary Young passed to Nigel Ferguson for his third goal of the game. Brian Dunsieuth put the game out of reach with the sixth St. Marys' goal at 10:03.

Must Win

The Kinsmen play the third game of the best of three series next Saturday at 2 p.m. in St. Marys. To stay alive, Milton must win. This would force a fourth game on Milton ice.
