New Hydro Region Manager

Appointment of Lavern Angus "Vern" Coles to the responsible, senior engineering position of Operations Engineer for Ontario Hydro's Central Region was announced by Region Manager Ad-

am S. Smith. The appointment became effective April 1. Mr. Coles succeeds the late N. H. "Herb" Brown who died March 1.

(Ontario Hydro's Central Region serves a triangular section of the province some 2,900 square miles in extent, stretching along Lake Ontario's shore from Bronte almost to Port Hope, with the apex at Sutton on Lake Simcoe. It includes all Metro Toronto and widely separated places such as Oakville and Oshawa, Georgetown and Port Perry, Milton and Bowmanville and Brampton.)

In assuming the post of Operations Engineer for Central Region, Mr. Coles becomes the Commission's youngest regional operations engineer. He was 40 years old on November 11th, and has been a member of Ontario Hydro's engineering staff for the past 18 years. He started as a Junior Engineer following graduation from the University of Toronto in 1947 with a B.A.Sc. degree in Electrical Engineering.

Man-Made Lake, Picnic Island In Plans for Redeveloped Farm

Another recreation area in Halton's pleasant countryside is taking shape this winter at the farm home of Joe Ross in the Scotch Block, R. R. 3, Georgetown. On his property at the corner of the fifth line of Esquering and the Check Line, he has a scale model of the attractive park and pool he hopes to have ready by hot weather next summer.

In December, he began clearing brush and bulldozing, with Harry Trowbridge of Hornby contracting. A spring-fed creek runs through the family farm and its bed has been bulldozed and a dam is nearly complete. When the dam is in operation in the spring, a six or seven acre lake will form, with a depth of 15 feet at places and an estimated capacity of seven million gallons. He hopes the lake will be full in May.

In the middle of the lake will be a picnic island about 175 feet by 50 feet, where willows and an elm have been saved. The island will be reached by a small bridge.

There will be roads about the property, which is at the back of the farm and not visible from the road. On a high point of land, Mr. Ross expects to have an observation tower, where the view extends for 20 miles.

There is a quarry on the farm

and Mr. Ross thinks visitors would like to see it in operation.

All Own Work

Mr. Ross first saw a similar park on a television program and he is undertaking the work himself with no government help or subsidies. He has heard from the government, though, for he must comply with a series of strict regulations. Safety regulations cover boating and swimming.

Possibility of stocking his lake with trout is being considered. Another consideration is turning an implement shed into a dance hall.

In his home, Mr. Ross has a scale model of the project. Here, too, are some museum items—for instance, documents showing his great grandfather was granted land in the Scotch Block for army service, old guns, arrowheads and farm tools. Most of the interesting items have been in his family, which has been on this farm for generations. Work has stopped now until the frost is out of the ground.

Mr. Ross is keeping a diary recording his progress in developing "Rosslake". It describes how the collie nipped at the great wheels of the bulldozer at first, but soon became adapted to the noise and activity, which is the forerunner of another fine

Prior to their anniversary celebration, a linen shower was held at their home, given by Sandra Mathies and a stag was given by Paul Mathies on March 9.

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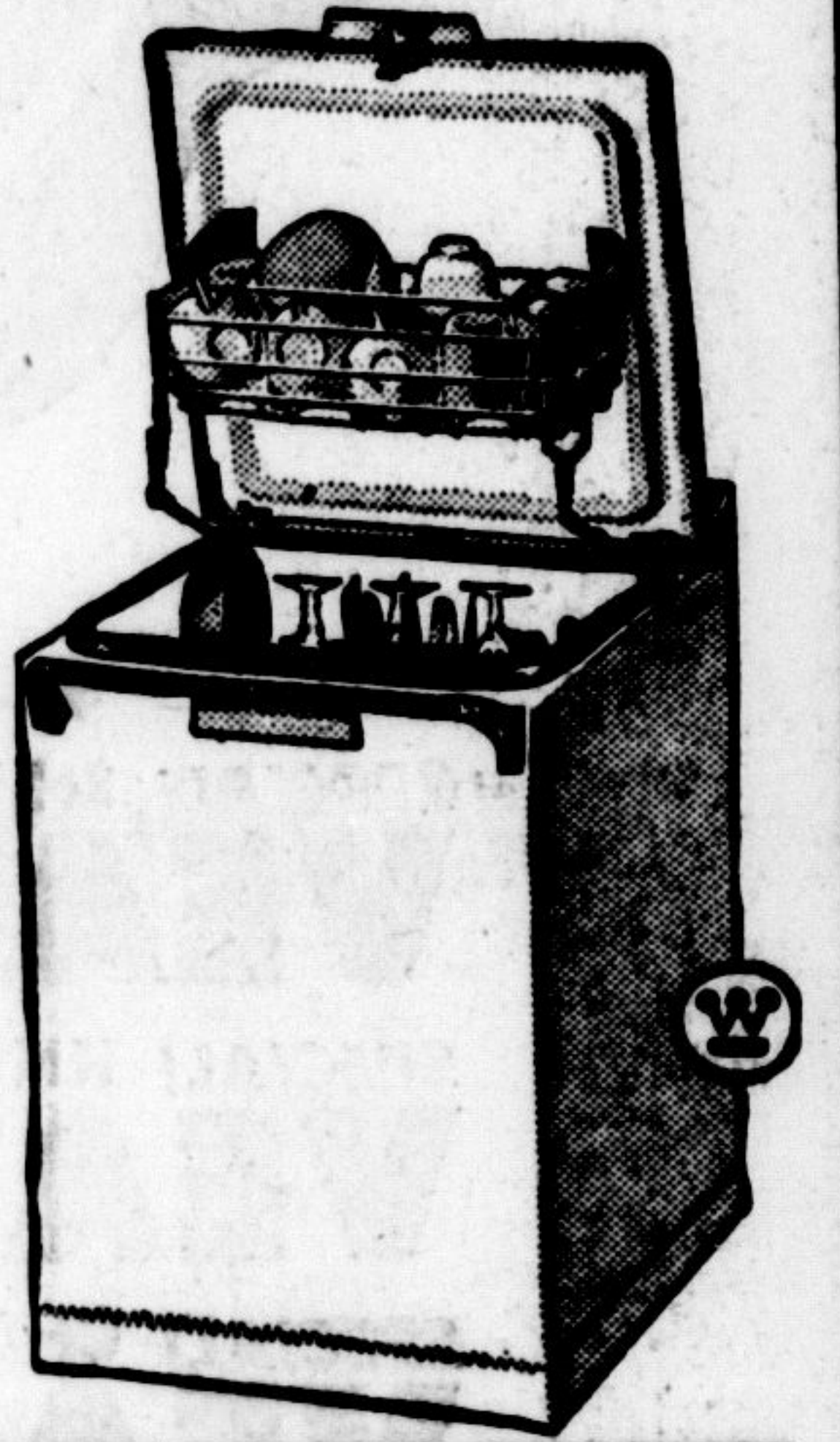
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P. C. Nominations

New Brunswick M. P. Speaker Still Two Men in Tory Race

The Federal nomination meeting of the Halton Progressive Conservative Association will hear Gordon Fairweather, M.P. for the Royal Riding of New Brunswick. The meeting is scheduled for the Williams Avenue High School in Milton on Friday, April 23.

Mr. Fairweather is a former Cabinet Minister in New Brunswick, having been appointed in 1958 Attorney-General at age 35, the youngest in the history of New Brunswick. He moved to the Federal Parliament in 1962 and has been a leading spokesman for the Conservative Party during the last session.

Two in Race
So far two candidates have declared themselves in the race for the nomination. Reeve William Coulter of Nassagaweya Township and Mayor Allan Mason of Oakville, are expected to be joined by at least two others seeking the nomination.

A total of 736 delegates from the seven municipalities in Hal-

ton Riding will be eligible to vote for the Progressive Conservative nominee at the next Federal election. Despite denials by the Liberal Government in Ottawa, party officials expect that there will be a Federal election this summer or early fall.

O.S.D. Hosts Boy Scout Course

A "Training the Team" course was held on Saturday, March 27, at Ontario School for the Deaf, Milton. This is of course designed to train chosen Boy Scout leaders in the techniques of training other leaders. About 70 were in attendance.
