Police said a car driven by Bernhard Kittler of Guelph had a flat tire and the driver had to leave his car parked on the decelleration lane at the overpass and hitch-hike to a service centre a few miles west of Highway 401 for tools to change the tire. After obtaining the tools at the service centre on the north side of the highway, Mr. Kittler told police, he walked across the road and found John Kehoe getting gas for his car at the service centre on the south side of the

Kittler reportedly asked Kehoe for a ride back to his car at Campbellville, and the youth not only gave him a ride but stayed to help the motorist to change the tire as well.

After the tire was changed Kehoe was returning to his car (which was parked on the south side of the highway) when the westbound Drabick car struck him, killing him instantly. The Crown Attorney has not ordered an inquest, and no charges have been laid. Constable D. Ormsby of Milton O.P.P. investigated.
