

PLAY IT SAFE
In many parts of the country, unpasteurized milk is sold. If this milk is infected, and is consumed without being pasteurized, it may pass on such diseases as undulant fever, paratyphoid or other fevers. Unless you are sure that the milk you buy in the country is pasteurized, make it safe by heating it to simmering point over direct heat, keep it at that point for one minute, and then cool quickly. Your local or provincial health department will supply you with further information on home pasteurization on request.

TEACH DANGERS
A child's fascination with matches and fire can often be guided into safe channels by allowing him to do some job, under proper supervision. At the summer cottage, he might be shown how to light the wood stove, the incinerator or, if he is old enough, to light lamps. He should be taught the danger of carelessness with matches where forest fires could be started.

Presbytery of West Toronto Holds Business Meeting Here

What happens at a presbytery meeting? The people of this community had the opportunity of learning first hand when the Presbytery of West Toronto of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met in Knox Church, Milton, for its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, April 13.

Some 60 Presbyters (ministers and representative elders from the churches in the area from Bathurst Street in Toronto west to Milton) gathered to discuss the business of the church on the occasion.

Worship suitable to Holy Week was conducted by Rev. J. K. L. McGown, minister of Knox Church. The Moderator of Presbytery, Rev. F. R. M. Anderson, of Davenport Church, Toronto, then assumed the chair and the business proceeded.

The Presbytery Committees such as Church Extension, Missions, Inter-Church Relations,

Downtown churches and Christian Education reported.

It was agreed to move a portable church building from Weston to the Jane and Finch area to accommodate the new University congregation in the area of the new York University. Plans for changes in the structure of the Missions Committee were laid over for further study.

The report of the Christian Education Committee showed progress in the Presbytery in certain directions and not others.

An "order of the day" was set for 8 p.m. when the business was interrupted to hear a delegation from Fairbank Church, Toronto. Rev. J. K. Lattimore, of Morning-side Church, Toronto, a former Moderator, assumed the chair to permit Mr. Anderson to present a call in favour of Rev. D. L. Elder of Almonte, to the Fairbank congregation of which Mr. Anderson is the Interim Moderator. The call was "sustained as a regular gospel call" and ordered transmitted to the Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew, which will, if it sees fit, place it in Mr. Elder's hands for his decision as to acceptance or not.

There was concerned debate on the procedure for certifying students for the ministry as being suitable, and plans for an extension of St. Andrew's Church, Islington were studied, with final approval to be given by the Property Committee. A number of members of the sessions of local Presbyterian Churches were present and W. A. Marshall, and W. T. Randell were on hand to assist the Presbyters. Knox's Leader of Praise, James Martindale, played the organ for the worship periods.

A delicious supper was provided by the Ladies' Aid of Knox Church. The president of this group is Mrs. Leslie Willis.

The work-week was designed to give students taking the special one-year commercial course, opportunity of receiving first-hand experience in business, prior to
