

"Flowers of Hope" Seeds Mailed for Mother's Day

"Flowers of Hope" seeds for planting on Mother's Day were sent out last week by the North Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded. In a letter accompanying the seeds, executive members of the association asked for financial help from the citizens of the district with the aim of eventually providing an "Adult Training Centre" for the retarded adults in the area.

Because of new legislation, grants are now available for Retarded Children's Schools, but public subscription is still needed if the North Halton Association is to look after the adult retardates. Presently grants are only available for work with children up to 18 years of age, but executive members stressed, "the work is only really starting when a child is 18; further training is absolutely necessary if he is to become a useful member of the community."

Kinsmen Help
The Kinsmen Club of Milton annually assists the North Hal-

ton Association with its campaign, and this year the club packaged the seeds and handled the mailing of 2,000 campaign letters in the Milton area. Kinsmen vice-president Dan Pegg chaired the project and the Kinette club (wives of Kinsmen) did the majority of the packaging.

Donations are to be mailed to the Bank of Nova Scotia, Milton.
