There, quite unconcerned over the trouble they had caused the farmer were three trout fishermen. Asked by the farmer the reason for the fire in his bush, the anglers answered, "It keeps the mosquitoes away." We agree it does, but needless to say the tired farmer didn't find it funny.

Early Anglers
The increased popularity of fishing early in the morning has caused a problem. Many farmers and land owners would like to know who is around their place that time of the day. After all, how would you like to have strangers tramping over your property at three or four in the morning? In short fellows, watch your manners. 684 Prisoners

Jail Issues Annual Report

There were 640 prisoners committed to the Halton County Jail in Milton during the year ending March 31, 1965. The Milton Jail annual report issued this week points out. During the year, there were a total of 684 prisoners in custody. The Halton jail accommodates 28 male and three female prisoners. The largest jail population during the year was 33 men and one woman, while the lowest population was two. Average daily population was six, and the total days' stay worked out to 6,756 days.

First Timers
Of the prisoners, 560 were first time offenders, 30 were second timers, 18 were third timers and 32 had been imprisoned three times or more. Only one prisoner did not have elementary education and 364 had advanced education, while 239 were married and 401 were unwed.

Occupations of the 640 prisoners included eight agricultural, seven clerical, 27 commercial, 56 construction, 15 domestic, 293 laborers, 79 mechanics, seven personal service, five professional, 52 transportation, 27 manufacturers, 61 others and one without an occupation.

The 640 committals during the year included 620 men and 20 women. Of these, 39 were released on bail, 95 were acquitted and released, 252 paid fines, 40 were released on probation, 59 were released on suspended sentence, 95 served out sentences, 81 were transferred to other institutions

and 10 were left for other reasons. Of the 640 prisoners, 556 were Canadian, 18 English, four Irish, 11 Scottish, four United States and 47 from other countries.

The jail staff of 19, under the supervision of Governor E. G. Ryder, was paid salaries totaling \$55,248.89 during the year. Total maintenance (including salaries) came to \$65,603.02 and \$2,286.37 was spent on alterations additions and repairs

Three-Phase Building Plan Starts at Brookville School

Projected plans completed by Nassagaweya school board include a three-phase building program at Brookville school. Work will begin immediately to complete the first phase which includes two-room class room addition to the existing building.

School board members engaged the architectural firm of Kruschen and Daily of Waterloo to draw sketches of the proposed plan which is in keeping with wishes of the Department of Education to have larger school units.

Land Available
With an eye to the future, board members have acquired sufficient land to allow expansion of the school but will only build as the need arises. Wolfe Construction Company, Kitchener, were successful bidders for the final stage of the first phase of the projected building program, which, when complete will allow 12 rooms at the school.

Step two of the projected plan calls for five classrooms, industrial arts and Home Economics rooms, two kindergarten rooms, science room, library, nurse room and staff room.

Long range plans for the last and final phase calls for a gymnasium, two change rooms, two shower rooms, storage and instructor's room.

A car owned by A. Beck caught fire in a north Burlington lane-way early Friday morning of last week, and Milton Fire Department was called to extinguish it. The fire call arrived at 5:40 a.m. Damage to the vehicle was slight.

Kindergarten Next
For the first time in the history of Nassagaweya kindergarten classes will begin in September. One class will be held at the Brookville school and the second at the Masonic Lodge Hall in Campbellville.

In making the projected plan, school board trustees took into view the fact that grants are available for a library after 12 rooms have been built and grants available for a gymnasium after 20 rooms have been completed.
