

Zap, There Goes a Mosquito

District Man Invents Insect Exterminator

You know the ads that say "Zap, there goes perspiration"? Well, "Zap, there goes a mosquito" might well be the motto for a new invention dreamed up by a district man, Samuel DeMarco.

Mr. DeMarco lives on the Fourth Line south of Omagh, and recently retired from a lifetime in the construction industry in Toronto. His invention really does go "zap" as it wanders near his 4,000 insect cage. It's called an "electric insect exterminator" and is manufactured by Toronto Aluminum Industries Ltd., Toronto.

Popular Item
There are two types, retailing for \$69 and \$89 and the exterminators are expected to be a popular item for farmers with large orchards, cottage owners, or rural folks who like to sit outside in the summer evenings. The exterminator consists of a

balast, violet and blue ultra-violet "darklight" made of neon, circled by two aluminum grids. The inner grid holds a charge of 4,000 volts and the outer grid is quite safe to touch. The light draws flies, mosquitoes, June Bugs, wasps (but not bees, and other insects). They seem up to the outer grid and it closes up, but when they crawl through and touch the inner grid, a spark flies and the rig goes "zap" as the insect is electrocuted.

the orchard. He figures one exterminator will cover a three-acre market garden plot. The inventor feels his machine is superior to any type of insect destroyer, because it requires no chemical solutions, thereby does not taint the fruit or vegetable you are trying to protect. One city fellow, fed up with impure foods, offered to buy his whole garden crop when he learned the insects were being obliterated by electrical and not chemical means.

Safe for Children
Mr. DeMarco says his exterminator is completely safe as far as children are concerned, for they cannot get their fingers through the outer grid. His invention took several years to perfect and it was finally completed two years ago. He has patents pending in both U.S. and Canada and a few thousand have already been manufactured by the Toronto firm. It has been inspect-

AN ELECTRICAL INSECT EXTERMINATOR that really works wonders has been invented by Samuel DeMarco, Fourth Line near Omagh, and the inventor is shown with one of the two models now on the market. Made of aluminum, they attract all kinds of pests by an ultra-violet light, and a 4,000 volt charge is stored up in the inner of the two circular grids surrounding the light. A fly or mosquito just has to touch the inner grid and "zap" — that's the end.
