# Renew Request For 5 Buffalo

A renewed request for five buffalo, to be herded in a park at Rattlesnake Point Conservation Area west of Milton, went out last week from the Halton Region Conservation Authority to the Dominion veterinarian at Ottawa.

The Authority applied last year for five buffalo from the Buffalo National Park in Alberta, but the request was cancelled when the animals contacted a disease and 300 of the 17,000 animals herded there died. Authority member L. Fox of Burlington was in the West on a business trip last month and returned with some colored slide pictures he had taken of buffalo at Elk Island National Park, where the disease has not harmed the buffalo.

Anxious to provide this attraction in a natural valley at the bottom of the escarpment near Rattlesnake Point the Authority renewed its request with the hope the animals could be made available this year.

# Collect \$1,902 For Workshop

Less than \$2,000 has been collected so far for the "Flowers of Hope" campaign sponsored by the North Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded. To date a total of \$1,902 has been collected, campaign chairman Irene Randell reports and although no target had been set, she suggested that the amount was less than the total expected.

About 8,100 letters containing leaflets, a package of seeds and a personal letter from the campaign chairman, were sent out to residents of Acton, Georgetown and Milton. The chairman was pleased with the response from Acton and Milton citizens but was disappointed with amount raised in Georgetown. Totals for the towns so far are \$488 from Acton, \$737 from Georgetown and \$677 from Milton.


