# Larry McPhail Pops Three Run Homer Merchants Win Extra Inning Battle

Campbellville, playing far below the form that has taken them to nine consecutive league championships, squeaked through to an 11-8 extra inning victory over last place Preston on Sunday.

Harry Hamilton and Larry McPhail were the heroes of the exciting but loosely played ball game. McPhail, who had struck out twice previously (the only Campbellville strike-outs) came up with two on and none out in the 10th and promptly blasted the ball over the left field fence to end the drawn out contest. Hamilton had relieved a struggling Jack Roberts in the seventh with Campbellville leading 8-7. The bases loaded and none out.

**Squeeze Bunt**  
A squeeze bunt scored a run but from there on, Hamilton was invincible as he chalked up his first win of the season. Roberts was far off his usual form as he gave up eight runs off nine hits. He struck out five, walked two and hit two batters. In four innings, Hamilton gave up but one infield single as he struck out four.

George Moore was Preston's starter and over nine innings, he allowed 10 runs off eight hits. He struck out two, hit one batter and walked seven.

Campbellville took a 5-0 lead in the first. An error and two walks loaded the bases and Don Joyce's double drove in three runs. Joyce went to third on an infield out and John Nicholson walked. Then pitchers' pick-off throw then went far down the first base line and Nicholson scored all the way from first behind Joyce.

In the second, Preston got three back on an infield single by Wildfong, an error, a single by Gillis and a single by Goughlin and an infield out. This made it 5-3 for Campbellville.

**Starts Rally**  
Bill Elliot was safe on an error in the fourth, went to second on a walk and scored as the second baseman erred on Dredge's grounder. It was now 6-3 for Campbellville. Wingrove doubled to open the bottom half of the fifth for Campbellville and scored ahead of Stan Henderson, who blasted a home run over the left field fence. Campbellville led 8-3.

With one out in the top of the sixth, Reid walked, went to second on a passed ball and to third on an infield out. Four consecutive singles by Findlay, Goughlin, Moore and Millar plus a throwing error by Wingrove, produced four runs, to make it 8-7 for Campbellville.

An error and two hit batters loaded the bases for Preston in the seventh and brought in Hamilton to hurl. The previously mentioned squeeze bunt tied the score at 8-8.

Ken Moore walked to open the bottom of the 10th and went to second as Elliot dumped a Texas-league single into centre. Ortwein came in to relieve Moore and this set the stage for McPhail's dramatic game-winning homer.

**All Singles**  
All Preston's hits were singles as Millar and Goughlin each picked up two and Stark, McKeellar, Wildfong, Gillis, Findlay and Moore all got one each.

Stan Henderson, with a home run and a single, led the Campbellville attack. Don Joyce, Al Wingrove and Harry Zulerons all doubled and George Chester and Jack Roberts singled. This,

of course, was in addition to Larry McPhail's homer.

**Footnotes:** The win gave Campbellville a 3 won, 3 lost record. They have yet to win away from home this year. Campbellville fans who are worried about their team's showing thus far this year, may take some consolation from the fact that they had an identical 3 won, 3 lost record at this time last year and went on to win the league championship.

On Sunday, June 13, Campbellville hosts the strong Oakville Oaks, who are engaged in a great struggle for the league leadership with Hamilton.

Milton Red Sox put on their heavy hitting shoes Sunday afternoon and slapped three Georgetown hurlers for 10 safeties as they wrung up their first victory of the 1965 Halton County season. Paced by the slugging of Doug McCutcheon and the six hit pitching of Merv Fletcher, the Sox were easily too good for the Giants as they broke in front in the first inning and never gave up the lead — notching a 13-6 victory.

The first victory of the season followed four straight defeats for the Sox but club mentor Dick Clement is confident that it won't take nearly as long to win their second game. "We've got a good chance against Preston tonight and Mike Boughton is ready to go," the optimistic coach reported. The Sox will host the cellar dwelling Preston squad for a 6:45 p.m. game at the fair grounds tonight and he's calling the shot for victory number two.

The starry performance of Doug McCutcheon (two walks, a single, a triple and a homer),

the return of veteran infielder Glen Dance to the starting lineup and solid efforts from Merv Fletcher and Chris Ramshaw were cited as the major reasons for Milton's success on Sunday.

McCutcheon, probably the league's best centre fielder, played first base for the short-handed Sox and had a perfect day at the plate. "Merv," the coach reports, "was steadier than usual and he turned in a real good job." Chris Ramshaw had two singles and played a strong game in centre field. The fielding star of the contest was Glen Dance, making his first appearance in the Red Sox lineup up this season. Besides making several fine plays, Glen reached base four out of five times. He went to the plate with three walks and being hit by the pitcher once. "Glen's really good defensively and he'll really help us if he keeps coming out," Dick said.

Merv Fletcher, who entered the game with a record of no wins and one loss, hurled the nine innings and fanned five Giants. He allowed six runs and six hits and issued seven free passes. Lefthander Jim Lindsay started on the mound for the Giants and failed to last the first inning. He was relieved by slow-baller Glen Gibbs, who left in favor of Danny Arbie in the fifth inning. the most effective, allowing only three runs and two hits over the final four innings.

Milton broke into an early 5-0 lead in the first inning after squelching a Giant rally in the top of the first with a neat double play. With the bases loaded and one out, Pete Lawson drove a hard ground ball to Art Melanson at third. He touched the sack to force one runner and then fired to first for the inning ending out. A single by Chris Ramshaw, a walk, a double by Brian McDuffie, a walk, a hit batsman and a single by Pete Sherrett accounted for five Mil-

ton runs in the bottom of the inning.

In the second frame, the Giants struck for two runs but that was quickly erased in the third stanza as a triple by Doug McCutcheon, two walks and singles from Chris Ramshaw and Pete Sherrett accounted for three more runs. Chris Ramshaw had two singles for Milton, Brian McDuffie doubled, Doug McCutcheon had a single, a home run and a triple, Pete Sherrett had three singles and newcomer Andre Brouillard had a single. Brouillard saw limited action with the Campbellville Merchants last season.

After tonight's game against Preston, the Sox will have a one week lay-off, starting action again a week tonight in Georgetown against the Giants.
