

John Jarvis Strokes Five Safeties Two Players Ejected in Third Inning

Omagh sluggers bombed two Milton hurlers for 17 hits on Sunday afternoon as they captured a 13-5 decision in an Inter-County Fastball League game at the Ontario Steel Plant diamond.

Paced by hard hitting John Jarvis, Omagh scored two runs in the first inning, five in the second, one in the sixth, one in the seventh and four in the eighth to cap their second straight win.

Milton broke back for fourth inning runs but hardly threatened after that, scoring one more tally in the eighth. The Krantz sponsored club left 12 men stranded on base.

Registration of bicycles can be made at the Mobile Safety Education Unit at the following times from 5.00 p.m. to 9.00 p.m.

- June 9th, 1965 — Palermo Public School
- June 10th, 1965 — P. W. Merry Public School
- June 14th, 1965 — Reed-Redfern Limited (Hwy. 25 and No. 10 Sideroad)
- June 15th, 1965 — Munn's Public School

It will not be necessary to bring the bicycle to the registration location but the following information will be required, and no registration will be issued if this information is not submitted.

- Serial Number (Found only on the frame of the bicycle)
- Colour of bicycle
- Make of bicycle
- Type of bicycle (Man's, Lady's or Juvenile)

The cost of registration is \$1.00 per bicycle, payable at time of registration. The main purpose of bicycle licensing is for identification and recovery and is of benefit not only to the municipality but to the bicycle owner as well. The bicycle is registered only once while it is the property of the registered owner, thus eliminating the need of licensing each year.

At the conclusion of the above schedule registration can be made at the Oakville Police Safety Offices, 7th Line immediately south of the municipal division on the east side of the highway. Hours will be from 9.00 a.m. to 4.00 p.m., Tuesday and Thursday only.

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
