

# ALL BICYCLES MUST BE LICENSED

Registration of bicycles can be made at the Mobile Safety Education Unit at the following locations from 5.00 p.m. to 9.00 p.m.

June 9th, 1965 — Palermo Public School June 10th, 1965 — P. W. Merry Public School June 14th, 1965 - Reed-Redfern Limited (Hwy. 25 and No. 10 Sideroad)

It will not be necessary to bring the bicycle to the registration location but the following information will be required, and no registration will be issued if this information is not submitted.

June 15th, 1965 - Munn's Public School

(a) Serial Number (Found only on the frame of the bicycle)

(b) Colour of bicycle

(c) Make of bicycle

(d) Type of bicycle (Man's, Lady's or Juvenile)

The cost of registration is \$1.00 per bicycle, payable at time of registration. The main purpose of bicycle licensing is for identification and recovery and is of benefit not only to the municipality but to the bicycle owner as well. The bicycle is registered only once while it is the property of the registered owner, thus eliminating the need of licensing each year.

At the conclusion of the above schedule registration can be made at the Oakville Police Safety Division Offices, 7th Line immediately south of the municipal offices on the east side of the highway. Hours will be from 9.00 a.m. to 4.00 p.m., Tuesday and Thursday only.
