Guelph Professor Wins Fellowship for Research

The husband of a local girl, Dr. M. H. Miller, professor and co-ordinator of research in the department of soil science at University of Guelph, has been awarded a post-doctoral overseas fellowship to carry out research work in England for a year.

Dr. Miller's wife is the former Joan Colling, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Colling of R.R. 3, Campbellville. Mrs. Miller and their three children will accompany the professor to Europe.

From Soil to Root
The award is given by the National Research Council for research on mechanisms of transfer of nutrients from the soil into the plant root. Dr. Miller will conduct most of this study at the radiobiological laboratory of the Agricultural Research Council at Wantage, England in collaboration with Dr. R. Scott Russell of that laboratory.

While overseas Dr. Miller will visit soils research institutes in eight western European countries. In addition he has been invited to present a paper on his current research at a symposium on the use of isotopes and radiation in soil-plant nutrition studies. This symposium is sponsored by International Atomic Energy Agency and the Food and Agriculture Organiza-

tion of the United Nations. It will be held in Ankara, Turkey, at the end of June.

and his research contributions have been widely recognized. A native of York County, he graduated from the Ontario Agricultural College and obtained a master's degree and doctor of philosophy degree from Purdue University.

Jack Elliott, a real estate salesman testified that he valued the 198 Mill St. property on March 14, 1964 at \$8,000 cash or \$8,800 to \$9,000 when paid in installments. He also testified that the value of the property has risen because of the present demand for small commercial lots and because of improvements on Mill St. He valued the property at \$8,800 to \$9,000 cash today.

Joint Owner
Mrs. Anna Jensen testified that she was joint owner of the 198 Mill St. property with her husband and that, being aware of the arrangements, she gave him authority to enter the contract.

Milton clerk-manager R. B. Reynolds testified there is no by-law on record that had been given a third reading authorizing purchase of the Jensen property, although one had received a first reading.

The case for the defence was to be presented when the hearing resumed Wednesday morning, too late for coverage in today's issue.

Hot Sunday Parade

Legion Dedicates Cairn

A parade of 250 Legionnaires, bandsmen, Scout and Guide groups, firefighters, councilors and special guests marched through the sweltering sun Sunday afternoon, to officially dedicate the new Legion memorial cairn at Evergreen Cemetery.

Hardy veterans who survived 20-mile treks during Army training camp sessions, and who fought battles in some of the hottest parts of Europe, couldn't recall a hotter day for a parade than Sunday. Most were soaked to the skin with perspiration as they trudged along the streets, but Legion officials reported the fierce heat didn't cut the attendance any. It was one of the best attendances for a parade in many years, one officer commented.

The parade was also held to mark the anniversary of D-Day, June 6.

In Memory . . .
Legion padre Rev. J. L. Graham conducted the service, and dedicated the stone monument in memory of those who had fought and died . . . "that freedom and truth might ever live." District Commander Doug McDonald of Brantford, a second vice-president of the Ontario Provincial Command, read the unveiling message. "When I reflect upon what this memorial represents, I feel very humble. It is a tribute to men who, through their action, paid the supreme sacrifice for this country and this community," he said.

"This memorial is a physical lasting tribute to our war dead. There is a need for such memorials today, in an age where unnatural international tensions have become natural. As a people, we need to be reminded of the real cost of war. We need to be reminded that each of the dead, whose memory is here commemorated, had a

choice at one time — that choice was an honorable death or a life under tyranny.

Frank Shannon was parade marshal for the day, with David Bowman of Georgetown acting as color party sergeant-at-arms. Georgetown and Port Credit Legionnaires joined the local color party to swell it to 24 flags, including a Canadian maple leaf flag plus the Jack, Ensign and Legion banners.

Two Bands
The Lorne Scots Pipe Band led the parade and the Lorne Scots Military Band joined in, playing the hymns and anthems at the cemetery service as well. Also in the parade were 17 Milton Fire Brigade members, 10 from the Lions Club, 90 Scouts, Cubs, Brownies, Guides and Rangers.

M.P. Dr. Harry Harley of Oakville, M.P.P. George Kerr of Burlington, Mayor S. G. Childs and most members of Milton Council joined the procession. Bugler Joe Waters sounded the Last Post as the cairn was dedicated and the maple leaf flags on either side were lowered to half mast during the memorial service.

The Ladies' Auxiliary served lunch after the parade.
