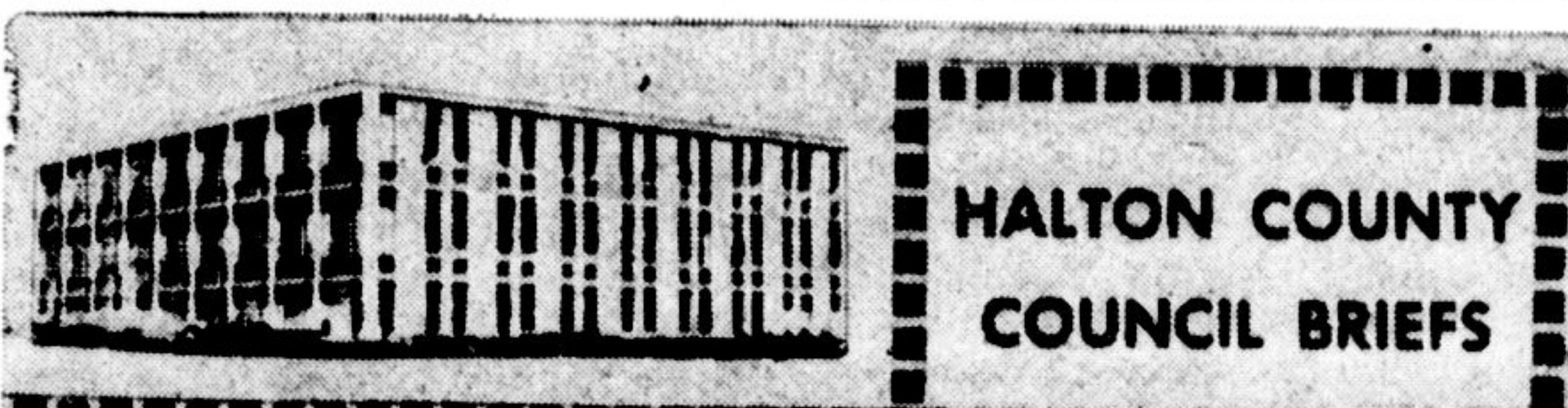

HALTON COUNTY COUNCIL BRIEFS

At their regular monthly meeting last week, Halton County councillors:

- Passed a supplementary by-law calling for an additional expenditure of \$397,000 over and above the figure approved earlier in the year, for county roads.

- Approved the formation of a County Display Committee to set up an exhibit at the International Plowing Match to be in York County in the fall. Cost of the exhibit, which will be a tent form, is not to exceed \$2,000. Deputy Reeve William Hunter of Georgetown has been named chairman of the committee.

- Approved the appointment of Clifford Hibbert of Georgetown as Chief of Emergency Clothing for the Halton County Emergency Measures Organization. A letter will be sent to the Town of Georgetown, asking their approval of the appointment.

- Decided to delay taking a vote on the County Assessment

Commissioner system. Letters were received from the Town Clerks of Georgetown and Milton advising that both towns would be in favor of the appointment of a County Assessment Commissioner. The Township of Nassagaweya and the town of Oakville are not in favor of the appointment at this time.

- Approved a meeting of representatives of the Oakville, Burlington and North Halton Associations for the Mentally Retarded with representatives of the Assessment, Finance and Welfare Committee and Mr. Berendsen of the Ontario Association for the Mentally Retarded. Object of the meeting will be to discuss the grants and arrive at a basis for County grants.

- Approved the appointment of Dr. Gordon Askwith as director of the Halton County Children's Aid Society. Dr. Askwith will assume his duties on August 1. He replaces Paul Jolliffe as director.

Eight accidents with property damage estimated at \$2,435 occurred in the north Halton area serviced by the Milton O.P.P. in the last week.

Last Saturday six of these accidents occurred. A minor accident on the 3rd line, Nassagaweya brought \$60 damage to cars owned by C. H. Mitchell, R.R. 2, Campbellville and V. Borschevski R.R. 3, Campbellville. A collision on the 7th line near Highway 7 caused \$200 damage to a car driven by R. E. Mellon, Acton and \$100 damage to a car driven by R. A. Duby of Oakville.

An accident on the 401 caused \$500 damage to two cars and another on the same highway caused \$275 to two more out of town cars. E. E. Osborne, R.R. 1, Georgetown, was injured in a collision which brought \$100 damage to his car and \$500 damage to a car driven by Lynda Barclay, R.R. 3, Georgetown. Mr. Osborne was treated at Georgetown hospital and released. Gary Grey was involved in an accident on the 8th line, Esquesing which brought \$100 damage to his car.

On July 18 a car driven by an Islington man received \$500 damages in an accident on the 10th line, Esquesing. John Simpson was involved in an accident on the 7th line which brought \$100 damage to his car.

Re-Alter School Boundaries

For the second time in two months, Milton Public School Board trustees have been forced to alter school boundaries for the September term.

At their Monday, July 12 meeting, trustees passed a motion stating pupils who would normally attend grade six at the J. M. Denves school in September and who live north of the south half of Miles St. to Bell St., Robert St. and Sarah St. to Commercial, will be allotted to the Bruce St. school.

The second half of the new motion states, "principal Mr. Bell is to set up classes for grad-

es seven and eight in the Martin St. school, Bruce St. and J. M. Denves schools, keeping in mind as far as possible, location and sizes of classes." The motion concludes, "class allocation lists of each school are to be published in the September 1 issue of The Canadian Champion."

Supervising principal E. W. Foster reported the newest changes were forced because of failures and the setting up of an opportunity class.

A motion passed at the May meeting which altered the boundaries was rescinded.
