Trust Company Profit Increase

A substantial increase in net profits for the first half of 1965 over the comparable period last year has been experienced by the Halton and Peel Trust and Savings Company.

Net profits after taxes and other expenses for the first half of the year are \$165,515 against \$96,420 for the same period in 1964.

Savings and term deposits are \$43,406,996 in comparison with \$31,637,279 for the first half of 1964. Bonds and stocks are \$8,183,543 against \$7,082,677 in 1964. None of these bonds or stocks are in default and they are carried on the books of the company for less than market value.

First mortgage loans are \$36,061,897 compared to \$26,267,329 for the first half of 1964.

O.K. \$4,892 Addition Town Sewage Plant

A \$4,892 addition that will double the capacity of the chlorination tank at the Milton sewage treatment plant, was approved by councillors last week. The addition would give the plant a double capacity during rush periods, and allow it to handle a sewage equivalent of 14,000 population during rush periods.

The job will be done by the same firm that recently won a contract to construct an addition to the plant.

At the same meeting, councillors reviewed costs on the sewage plant work and came up with a total cost of \$305,883. The C.M.H.C. will provide a loan for two-thirds the price of the work (\$203,922) on a 20-year plan, with a 25 per cent forgiveness clause and interest at five and three-eighths per cent. This reduces the town's cost to \$254,902.

Oppose Ditch

The opening of a drainage ditch in West Flamboro Township which might benefit two or three Township farmers, was opposed by members of the Halton Region Conservation Authority at their recent July meeting in Milton.

The project, which would cost about \$25,000, is also being opposed by West Flamboro councillors. Although the project would not touch on Conservation Authority land, Authority members stated, "it is the very opposite to what we're trying to do as Conservationists—we're trying to save water."

Authority members agreed to have a letter drafted and sent to government officials asking for the abandonment of the project.

Five Volunteers

Need 13 for St. John Brigade

Five Milton residents have volunteered to join a Milton Division of the St. John Ambulance Brigade. Thirteen more qualified people are needed in order to establish the charter that would begin the first aid corps in Milton.

Any person who holds a fundamental or senior first aid certificate of either the St. John Ambulance or the Red Cross and who is over 16 years of age is qualified to join the division. Stan Callard, one of three men who are working to form a Milton Division, says, "I am sure that there are at least 13 people in Milton who can qualify."

The Milton Division would supply town residents with first aid in any emergency and would arrange first aid personnel for industries by working with the Workmen's Compensation Board.

Acton Members
Mr. Callard, Frank Lawson and Don Miller are the three men who are trying to organize the Milton Division. All three are Milton residents who are members of the Acton Division of St. John Ambulance. They would transfer to the Milton Division and complete its formation.

Persons who attended recent first aid courses at Milton District High School, the Ontario School for the Deaf, and P. L. Robertson's are qualified to become brigade members. Anyone who is qualified is asked to call Mr. Callard at 878-6665, Mr. Lawson at 878-2903, or Mr. Miller at 878-3259 for further information.

Once a charter of 18 persons is arranged, the Milton Division will ask local service clubs for sponsorship to cover costs of first aid supplies and upkeep of the Division. Members of the brigade would attend instructional meetings, an annual inspection and an annual first aid re-examination. The Division would arrange first aid and home nursing courses for anyone interested.

Women Welcome

Women may also become members of the Division if they hold the necessary first aid certificate and a home nursing certificate, or agree to obtain a home nursing certificate in the first year they join the Division.

There are six Milton residents who are members of the Acton Brigade. They have supplied Milton with first aid at all Junior "C" hockey games last winter, at the Milton Fall Fair and at the Steam Reunion. Members of the brigade are "voluntary professionals" and can supply trained first aid help at sport-
